

Background

- Penal Code section 1170.45 directs
 Judicial Council to report on disposition
 of criminal cases according to
 defendants' race and ethnicity.
- Judicial Council staff submitted reports since 2001.

Outcomes studied



Findings from current report

Relative to similarly-situated White defendants:

Conviction likelihood:

- Hispanic defendants 2.2% more likely
- Black defendants 1.4% less likely

Felony v. misdemeanor:

- Hispanic defendants 0.5% more likely to receive felony
- Black and Asian/PI defendants 0.8% and 0.1% less likely to receive felony

Findings from current report

Relative to similarly-situated White defendants:


Prison sentence:

- Hispanic individuals 1.5% more likely to receive prison sentence
- No statistically significant difference for other race/ethnic categories


Prison Length:

No statistically significant difference

Sentenced to prison: Raw numbers



Sentenced to prison: Violent offense with no prior criminal history



Accounting for differences

Criminal history

- Number of prior convictions by offense type and level
- Amount of time previously incarcerated in prison and jail
- Most serious prior conviction offense severity
- Time since most recent conviction
- Whether defendant was on probation at time of arrest

Current offense


- Offense type and level
- Most serious offense severity
- Number of charges by level
- Number of arrests involved in disposition
- Maximum sentence exposure for charges

Demographic and location

- Age
- Gender
- County

"SIMILARLY SITUATED"

Sentenced to prison: Estimated difference relative to White defendants



Considerations and limitations

Systemic

- Many steps and actors from arrest to disposition
- 97% of convictions are achieved through plea bargains

Data Quality

- Better data has allowed better analyses
- Data source is known to be incomplete and dynamic
