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Executive Summary

Penal Code section 13155 requires Judicial Council staff, commencing January 1, 2013, to collect information from trial courts regarding the implementation of the 2011 Criminal Justice Realignment Legislation and make the data available annually to the California Department of Finance (DOF), Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC), and Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC) by September 1. This is the 10th annual court realignment data report. It will be distributed to the DOF, BSCC, and JLBC. The report, *Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2021)*, is included as Attachment A to this report.

Relevant Previous Council Action

The first annual report of the data collected from the trial courts on the implementation of the 2011 Realignment Legislation was provided to the Judicial Council by its staff at the council meeting on August 23, 2013. The annual reports for subsequent years were provided at meetings on August 22, 2014; August 21, 2015; August 26, 2016; September 14, 2017; November 30, 2018; May 17, 2019; May 14, 2020; and May 20, 2021. Each report was sent to the DOF, BSCC, and JLBC by September 1.

Analysis/Rationale

Development of data elements

The Judicial Council's Court Executives Advisory Committee formed an ad hoc working group to identify and define appropriate realignment-related data elements. The Criminal Justice Realignment Data Working Group was composed of representatives from the superior courts of Alameda, Fresno, Los Angeles, Napa, Orange, Shasta, and Ventura Counties. The working group implemented quarterly reporting requirements and identified 29 data elements necessary to track sentencing, disposition information, and court workload. After receiving feedback from the trial courts, various data elements were adjusted and new data elements created to better track outcomes and court workload. These changes were implemented in the fourth quarter of calendar year 2013; no changes have been made since then. A list of current data elements is included as Attachment B.

Data collection and quality assurance

Trial courts submit data quarterly to the Judicial Council's Criminal Justice Services office using an online survey. The data reporting schedule for 2021 was as follows:

- Quarter 1 (January 1–March 31, 2021) data due April 30, 2021
- Quarter 2 (April 1–June 30, 2021) data due July 31, 2021
- Quarter 3 (July 1–September 30, 2021) data due October 31, 2021
- Quarter 4 (October 1–December 31, 2021) data due January 31, 2022

Judicial Council staff conduct quality assurance to examine the accuracy and reliability of the data collected. Staff members review reported data biannually and contact trial courts to discuss data quality, provide technical assistance regarding data collection, and gather information about local court processes. When necessary, courts revise their data in response to these checks. The data presented in the *Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2021)* report may be amended in subsequent reports because courts may revise previous data entries.

Although a number of courts have significant reporting challenges and are unable to provide complete data, data quality has continued to improve as a result of this cooperative effort and as the courts continue to refine their data reporting systems. Courts facing the greatest limitations have been instructed to prioritize items directly linked to the Criminal Justice Realignment allocation methodology (i.e., petitions to revoke/modify postrelease community supervision and petitions to revoke/modify parole). The totals presented in this statistical report may vary from those in JBSIS (Judicial Branch Statistical Information System) or the annual *Court Statistics Report* because of differences in reporting protocols and data definitions. A subset of the data elements is also posted on an interactive dashboard on the California Courts website at www.courts.ca.gov/38232.htm.

Fiscal Impact and Policy Implications

In addition to fulfilling a legislative mandate, data collected under Penal Code section 13155 are used to assist the Trial Court Budget Advisory Committee in determining realignment funding

allocations. Approximately \$73.7 million has been allocated since fiscal year 2013–14. The current allocation formula is based on each court’s proportion of the new workload associated with realignment, as measured by the total petitions filed to revoke and/or modify postrelease community supervision and parole. All courts have the ability to report the data elements currently used to establish funding allocations.

Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2021)

This report fulfills the requirement under Penal Code section 13155 that the Judicial Council submit data regarding the implementation of the 2011 Criminal Justice Realignment legislation to the California Department of Finance, the Board of State and Community Corrections, and the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.

Please note the following:

- The data presented in Tables 1–5 reflect the annual total of each item for all quarters reported by each court to the Judicial Council. The reporting period is calendar year 2021 (January 1–December 31, 2021). This information may be revised and amended to correct initial data reporting errors or to complete partially entered reports, but is current as of **February 18, 2022**. The reporting schedule for 2021 was as follows:
 - **Quarter 1:** January 1–March 31, 2021 (data due April 30, 2021)
 - **Quarter 2:** April 1–June 30, 2021 (data due July 31, 2021)
 - **Quarter 3:** July 1–September 30, 2021 (data due October 31, 2021)
 - **Quarter 4:** October 1–December 31, 2021 (data due January 31, 2022)
- Many courts began implementing new case/data management systems and are still in the process of transitioning to these systems. Doing so has presented significant and ongoing barriers to reporting many of the data elements in the report. Despite these challenges, approximately 90 percent of the courts were able to report most (70 percent or more) of the requested data. The following notations are used for courts reporting partial data:
 - * Reported three quarters of data.
 - ** Reported two quarters of data.
 - *** Reported one quarter of data.
- Note that the sample size (n) for each data element is the total number of courts reporting any data for that item, including courts reporting fewer than four quarters. Please see Attachment B for a full description of each data element.

28. Number of calendar events set on petitions or court motions to revoke/modify parole.
A calendar event is defined as a court proceeding set in the course of a criminal matter.
29. Number of contested evidentiary hearings held on petitions or court motions to revoke/modify parole.
A contested evidentiary hearing is defined as a hearing in which the factual basis of the petition is contested and the parties present oral or documentary evidence in support of or in opposition to the factual allegations of the petition.
