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Equal Access Fund: Report to the
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Executive Summary

On December 24, 2025, the Judicial Council's Center for Families, Children & the Courts submitted to the Department of Finance *Equal Access Fund Evaluation Report: Reporting Period January 1, 2024–December 31, 2024*. The report highlights activities, outcomes, and expenditures of Interest on Lawyers' Trust Accounts (IOLTA) formula grants, competitive partnership grants, and consumer debt grants and was provided to the Judicial Council by the Legal Services Trust Fund Commission of the State Bar of California, as required by the Budget Act of 2021 (Sen. Bill 129; Stats. 2021, ch. 69).

Relevant Previous Reporting or Action

On September 20, 2024, the Judicial Council approved the fiscal year 2024–25 distributions of Equal Access Fund monies to the Legal Services Trust Fund Commission to be awarded as grants to legal services providers and support centers to provide civil legal services to indigent persons, as allocated in the Budget Act of 2024 (Assem. Bill 107; Stats. 2024, ch. 22) (Link A). The approved distribution was \$40.9 million for the Equal Access Fund IOLTA-Formula Grants and Partnership Grants (Link B).

In addition, on September 20, 2022, the Judicial Council approved the distribution of \$15 million of Equal Access Fund monies for services related to consumer debt matters affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, as allocated in the Budget Act of 2022 (Assem. Bill 178 (Ting); Stats. 2022, ch. 45) (Link C). Of the total, \$14.3 million was allocated for the 2023–2025 grant

cycle, including \$4.8 million allocated to 20 legal services providers and support centers to support consumer debt–related civil legal services affected by the coronavirus pandemic from January 1 through December 31, 2024 (Link D).

Analysis/Rationale

The Budget Act of 2021 (Sen. Bill 129; Stats. 2022. ch. 69) requires the State Bar of California to report annually to the Judicial Council on funding allocations, annual expenditures, and program outcomes for all Equal Access Fund and federal funding allocations. The Budget Act also directs the Judicial Council to submit this report to the Department of Finance by January 1 of each year, covering the prior fiscal year (Link E).

The report submitted to the Department of Finance on December 24, 2025, is included as Attachment A, *Equal Access Fund Evaluation Report: Reporting Period January 1, 2024–December 31, 2024*. Highlights of program outcomes are summarized below.

IOLTA formula and partnership grants

During the reporting period of January 1 to December 31, 2024, 30,557 attorney-client cases were closed among 110 IOLTA-formula grantees. The majority of closed cases related to immigration, housing, or domestic violence. The main legal benefits included obtaining access to housing, enforcing rights to safe and habitable housing, obtaining citizenship or lawful permanent residency, and obtaining temporary restraining orders. The main economic benefits included back awards, lump sum awards, settlements, monthly benefits, and reduction or elimination of claimed amounts, resulting in \$25.1 million recovered and \$7.9 million saved for clients.

Partnership grants funded 37 court-based projects that provided self-help services to self-represented litigants in 15 superior courts. Most self-help services were related to civil harassment, housing, and family law.

Consumer debt grants

The purpose of the consumer debt grants is to provide indigent persons with civil legal services related to consumer debt matters affected by the coronavirus pandemic from January 1 through December 31, 2024. During the reporting period, 1,773 attorney-client cases were closed among 20 grantees.

Fiscal Impact and Policy Implications

The programs described in these reports assist the judicial branch in implementing Goal I of the *Strategic Plan for California’s Judicial Branch*—Access, Fairness, Diversity, and Inclusion—by increasing representation for low-income persons.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 1999, the California Legislature established the Equal Access Fund (EAF), in order “to improve equal access and the fair administration of justice.” A study on access to justice conducted by the State Bar in 2024¹ revealed that in any given year, nearly three-quarters of Californians experience civil legal issues, but receive no help, or inadequate help, for 85 percent of these problems. Due to this justice gap, a significant proportion of Californians are not receiving much-needed legal assistance. EAF is critical to legal aid and providing access to justice for vulnerable Californians who are unable to afford an attorney. Legal aid intervention helps Californians remain in their homes, maintain employment, improve health outcomes, and become better advocates for themselves.

In 2024, the State Bar awarded EAF grants to 89 nonprofit organizations whose primary purpose is to provide free civil legal services to indigent people in California and 21 nonprofit organizations whose primary purpose is to provide legal training, legal technical assistance, or advocacy support to the organizations that provide direct legal services to indigent people. Organizations that provide direct legal services are called Qualified Legal Service Projects (QLSPs) and organizations that support QLSPs are called support centers (SCs). Recipients of EAF grants must use the funds to support an identified set of activities with measurable outcomes.

EAF is distributed in two parts: (1) 90 percent of the funds are distributed according to the statutory Interest on Lawyers’ Trust Accounts (IOLTA) formula² as EAF–IOLTA grants and (2) 10 percent of the funds are distributed as Partnership Grants—discretionary grants for joint projects between courts and legal service programs to provide legal assistance at or near courthouses to pro per litigants. Unlike the EAF–IOLTA grants that are distributed to IOLTA-eligible organizations through a statutory formula based on qualified and county expenditures, Partnership Grants are awarded through a competitive process. EAF–IOLTA and Partnership Grants are typically awarded over a one-year period commencing January 1³.

In addition to annual EAF–IOLTA and Partnership Grant disbursements, the State Budget Act of 2022 (Budget Act) included a one-time appropriation of \$15 million in Equal Access Funds to be distributed as grants to QLSPs and SCs to provide civil legal services for indigent Californians related to consumer debt matters affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, with special preference to projects serving rural and underserved communities. Consumer Debt grants are three-year grants, with the grant period beginning on January 1, 2023.

Pursuant to reporting requirements under the Budget Act, this report provides an overview of expenditures, services, and outcomes achieved, and highlights the impact of EAF–IOLTA,

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Partnership Grant, and Consumer Debt Grant funds during the reporting period of January 1–December 31, 2024.

Key Findings (January 1, 2024–December 31, 2024):

- EAF–IOLTA grantees assisted a total of 30,304 indigent Californians.
- EAF–IOLTA grantees closed a total 30,557 cases, most of which were in the areas of housing, immigration, and domestic violence.
- Grantees recovered over \$25.1 million for clients through back awards, lump sum awards, settlements, or monthly benefits.
- Grantees saved \$7.9 million for clients by reducing or eliminating amounts that clients would have otherwise owed.
- EAF–IOLTA grantees assisted 181,946 indigent Californians with other services, including self-help clinics, educational workshops and trainings, outreach events, and hotline calls.
- Partnership Grant projects provided 20,107 individuals with information on substantive legal options. Most Partnership Grant projects used remote services for self-represented litigants (SRLs) in one-on-one services and group-setting services.
- Consumer Debt Grant-funded organizations closed 1,773 cases for indigent Californians. Through these cases, projects were able to save clients at least \$3.6 million and recover at least \$301,374 for clients.
- Consumer Debt Grant-funded projects also assisted 13,589 indigent Californians through other services, including self-help clinics, educational workshops, and outreach events.

EQUAL ACCESS FUND GRANTS (IOLTA–FORMULA)

This section details the expenditures, services, and outcomes achieved by EAF–IOLTA grants from January 1, 2024–December 31, 2024.

EXPENDITURES

For the 2024 grant year, the State Bar distributed \$31.7 million in EAF–IOLTA grants to 110 grantees (89 QLSPs and 21 SCs). In 2024, grantees spent \$31.2 million⁴ of the EAF–IOLTA distribution.

CASES CLOSED

Grantees reported on 30,557 EAF–IOLTA-funded closed cases⁷ for individuals with low income, seniors, and individuals with developmental disabilities⁸ in California in 2024.

Level of Service and Number of Services

Across all areas of law, case services provided for EAF–IOLTA-funded activities were mainly through counsel and advice (13,309) and limited-action matters (7,404).⁹

Most cases closed were in the areas of immigration (7,784), housing (6,161), and domestic violence (3,298).

- Immigration matters include naturalization, asylum, adjustment of status, citizenship, family petition, and trafficking T and U nonimmigrant-status visas.
- Housing matters include federally subsidized housing rights, foreclosure or title fraud, landlord-tenant (including foreclosure evictions), public housing, and homelessness.

⁷ For reporting purposes, “Case” is defined as a legal problem of a client (attorney-client relationship) and the legal activities or processes used in resolving those problems, which could be limited or extended services. “Closed Case” refers to a case where there is a resolution of the client’s problem, or where the client’s problem is not resolved but it is determined that no further action will be taken on the case.

Case Outcomes: Main and Economic Benefits

Grantees reported on main benefits (outcomes from a legal issue) and economic benefits (financial award or savings for the client)¹² achieved for each EAF–IOLTA-funded case closed during the reporting period. These main and economic benefits were developed through a collaborative process with the legal services organizations and synthesize the most common goals of legal services in different case types. Main benefits are outcomes that frequently cannot be quantified in economic benefits, such as clients being able to stay housed, having access to quality and affordable health, and obtaining other legal protections.

Across all areas of law, grantees reported 18,190 benefits, resulting in \$25.1 million recovered and \$7.9 million saved for clients.

The highest number of benefits achieved were reported in the areas of immigration (4,726), housing (3,683), and family/domestic violence (2,766).

- Immigration benefits include obtaining citizenship or lawful permanent residency and obtaining employment authorization.
- Housing benefits include enforcing rights to safe and habitable housing, and preventing evictions or foreclosures, thereby ensuring housing stability.
- Family/domestic violence benefits include obtaining a temporary restraining order under the Domestic Violence Prevention Act, modifying or enforcing non-custody orders, obtaining test evaluations, and appointment of minor’s counsel.

From January 1, 2024, to December 31, 2024, grantees recovered over \$25.1 million for clients through back awards, lump sum awards, settlement awards, or monthly benefits in the areas of immigration (\$8.9 million), housing (\$5.7 million) and income maintenance (\$3.9 million).

- Immigration economic benefits include back awards related to obtaining employment authorization.
- Employment economic benefits include obtaining unpaid wages due and relief from job discrimination, harassment, and/or retaliation and/or other adverse employment action.
- Family/domestic violence economic benefits recovered for clients include orders for monthly amount for child or spousal support over a set amount of time.


Cases Closed: Client Demographics¹⁷

For all EAF–IOLTA closed cases, grantees reported on demographic information collected for clients served, in categories such as gender, race and ethnicity, and age. EAF–IOLTA cases mostly assisted women and clients who identify as Hispanic.

EAF–IOLTA Grants Cases Closed: Gender

For the reporting period, EAF–IOLTA closed cases served more women (63.1 percent) than men (34.9 percent) and those who identify as nonbinary (0.4 percent).

(N=30,304 EAF–IOLTA Grants Cases Closed)**



OTHER SERVICES

In addition to receiving case assistance, grantees provide other services in instances where no attorney-client relationship is formed through self-help clinics, educational workshops, outreach events, and hotline calls. Grantees continually try to address the justice gap through these other services. For example, in self-help clinics and educational workshops, litigants can ask questions and gain a basic understanding about their civil legal issues, enabling them to feel empowered and more confident in the legal system. In outreach events, grantees frequently engage with community partners, which can be impactful in reaching vulnerable communities and connecting people to more integrated services.

From January 1–December 31, 2024, EAF–IOLTA-funded grantees provided 2,962 other services to 181,946¹⁸ people.

- Most self-help clinics were held in the areas of employment (303), family (291), and domestic violence (151).
- Most educational workshops and trainings were held in the areas of disability rights (283), immigration (139), and miscellaneous (92)¹⁹.
- Most outreach events were held in the areas of miscellaneous (186)²⁰, housing (181), and immigration (175).
- Most hotline calls were for issues involving immigration (4,815), housing (3,452), and domestic violence (2,610).

SUPPORT CENTER SERVICES

Approximately 20 percent of EAF–IOLTA grantees are SCs.²² The primary purpose of SCs is to provide legal training, legal technical assistance, or advocacy support to the organizations that provide direct legal services to indigent people. SCs are subject-matter experts that keep up with the latest developments in the law and help distill it for direct service providers to put into practice. They also advocate and help shape the law, to benefit vulnerable communities.

During the reporting period, EAF–IOLTA-funded SCs provided the following modes of assistance:

Training Events

SCs held a total of 298 training events across 12 areas of law. Most trainings were focused on health and long-term care (88), immigration (61), and housing (59).

Examples of advocacy and related activities:

- Advocacy related to legislation regarding expanding farmworker housing, Medi-Cal access for undocumented adults, and stronger labor protections
- Supporting sanctuary protections, public charge issues, and naturalization processes
- Providing technical assistance to pro bono attorneys on key case issues
- Launching initiatives like technical assistance roundtables, farmworker resilience programs, and improved reporting systems for pesticide exposure and CalFresh skimming, while collaborating on fair housing and tenant screening reforms.

Meetings

Meetings such as stakeholder convenings, are important for SCs to learn about the latest updates in their specific areas of law and share those updates with QLSPs. During the reporting period, SCs organized or participated in a total of 785 meetings. Meetings with the most QLSP attendees were in the areas of health and long-term care (356), housing (96), and employment (95).

LANGUAGE ACCESS

During the reporting period, the language other than English that was most used to provide services was Spanish. After Spanish, Mandarin and Farsi were the most frequently needed for language assistance. Grantees reported having 812 bilingual staff and volunteers, 147 of which were partially funded by EAF–IOLTA funds. Grantees also provided language assistance through interpreters, translation service, and community partners.

IMPACT OF COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Most grantees indicated that the pandemic continued to have a lingering impact both on service delivery and staff during the reporting period. For EAF–IOLTA activities, grantees reported a decrease in in-person events, staffing issues, and court/agency backlog.

PARTNERSHIP GRANTS

This section covers expenditures and outcomes achieved by Partnership Grant projects from January 1, 2024, to December 31, 2024. During this reporting period, 37 Partnership Grant projects were funded.

Partnership Grants require legal aid organizations to collaborate with court-based self-help centers to expand services available to low-income self-represented litigants (SRLs). Through this relationship, legal aid organizations and courts leverage their respective expertise and experience to identify and develop solutions to help address challenges faced by those who have low income. Another benefit of Partnership Grants is that they help streamline and make court processes more efficient, enabling more SRLs to be served.

EXPENDITURES

For the 2024 grant year, the State Bar distributed \$4.69 million to fund 37 Partnership Grant projects. As of December 31, 2024, those projects reported spending \$4.46 million, which is a combination of 2023 carryover expenditures and 2024 expenditures.²⁵

PROJECT SERVICES

Grantees reported on project services provided across all sources of funding. Although more than half of the Partnership Grant projects are funded by additional funding sources, the reported numbers below reflect services funded by Partnership Grants only. In order to

determine what portion of services are attributed to Partnership Grant funding, a pro-rata amount was calculated by dividing Partnership Grant expenses by current expenditures for the entire project. Services provided under the Partnership Grants are in addition to other self-help services funded by EAF–IOLTA.

- The top three focus areas were domestic violence and civil harassment (11), housing (11), and family (11).
- Across all projects, SRLs sought the most assistance in obtaining information on substantive legal options, (20,107), general court processes and procedures (19,570), and document preparation and/or review (17,097).
- In addition to providing one-on-one services²⁶ to SRLs, Partnership Grant projects held 1,505 workshops, which assisted 5,407 individuals.

Project and Court Coordination

Project and court staff collaborated closely to coordinate workshops, clinics, and services, ensuring self-represented litigants received timely and effective legal assistance. Coordination efforts included regular meetings, email communication, training sessions, and integration of court technology platforms to streamline workflows and address logistical challenges. These efforts led to improvements such as enhanced document quality, updates to filing procedures, expanded remote and in-person services, and targeted support for vulnerable populations, including those with disabilities or language barriers. Many grantees highlighted that the success of these projects was due to strong relationships and excellent communication between court and project staff, which fostered innovation and increased access to justice.

Key Changes to Projects

In response to staffing shortages, facility challenges, and evolving community needs, many grantees implemented program modifications throughout the year to maintain service delivery. Changes included hiring and reallocating staff to ensure flexibility, transitioning from group workshops to one-on-one services or pre-recorded materials to better support litigants, and increasing the use of virtual and hybrid service models. Operational adjustments were also made, such as relocating clinics, extending hotline hours, and introducing innovative tools like online booking systems and instructional videos to enhance accessibility.

Litigant Satisfaction

As part of project evaluation efforts, grantees administered satisfaction surveys to SRLs. According to grantees, most SRLs consistently praised staff for their professionalism, respectfulness, and expertise. Many noted that staff's clear explanations helped alleviate stress and confusion. Litigants frequently reported feeling more informed, confident, and prepared to navigate their legal matters after receiving assistance.

In particular, written materials and in-person workshops were highly valued for their clarity and practical usefulness. Programs offering trauma-informed assistance—especially those addressing sensitive issues such as domestic violence and guardianship—were described as indispensable. Grantees also shared informal feedback indicating that SRLs who received assistance were better equipped to pursue or resolve their litigation successfully and efficiently, participating more effectively in the legal process.

Beyond the SRL satisfaction surveys, grantees used additional methods to evaluate project services, including courtroom observations, in-person interviews, case reviews, and the Judicial Council's Survey for Judicial Officers and staff. These evaluation methods further highlighted positive outcomes for assisted SRLs, reinforcing the value and impact of the services provided.

Ongoing Challenges

Grantees cited various factors preventing them from meeting 2024 project goals, primarily staffing challenges including turnover, and vacancies. Service delivery obstacles such as lower workshop attendance and difficulties with remote services were also common. Many

organizations reported that SRL’s legal issues required more intensive support than anticipated, reducing overall numbers while maintaining quality. External factors including court-related issues and changing client demographics further impacted service delivery, though several grantees successfully adapted by shifting service models or exceeding goals in alternative areas.

LANGUAGE ACCESS

During the reporting period, the language other than English most used to provide Partnership Grant project services was Spanish. Mandarin, Farsi, and Vietnamese were the next most frequently needed for language assistance.

IMPACT ON SERVICE DELIVERY

More than half of the Partnership Grant projects reported challenges that impacted their service delivery in 2024. These challenges included staffing issues (17), increased time spent on cases/client hours (15), and court/agency backlog impacting time to obtain outcomes for clients (12). Grantees also reported difficulty in recruiting volunteers, limited client access to technology, and decrease in pro bono attorney availability.

CONSUMER DEBT GRANT

The Budget Act of 2022 allocated \$15 million in Equal Access Fund dollars to provide civil legal services related to consumer debt matters who were affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. After deductions for administrative costs, \$14.25 million was allocated to QLSPs and SCs for a three-year grant period. This section covers expenditures and outcomes achieved by the twenty Consumer Debt Grant-funded projects between January 1, 2024, to December 31, 2024, which was the second year of the grant period.

Consumer Debt Grants fund civil legal services for indigent persons related to consumer debt matters affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. These matters include debt collection, wage garnishment, bank account levy defense, financial abuse related to consumer debt, protection against unfair debt collection practices, and other debt matters including those related to student loans, auto loans, and credit cards.

EXPENDITURES

From January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024, projects spent \$4.91 million³¹

CASES CLOSED

Grantees reported on 1,773 Consumer Debt Grant-funded closed cases provided to individuals with low income, seniors, and people with developmental disabilities in California during 2024.

Level of Service and Number of Services

Assistance for Consumer Debt Grant-funded cases was mainly through the limited-service case categories of counsel and advice (944) and limited-action (339) matters, but grantees also provided many clients with extensive services (268).


Cases Closed: Client Demographics⁴⁰

For all 1,773 Consumer Debt Grant-funded closed cases, grantees reported on demographic information collected for clients served, in categories including gender, race and ethnicity, and age.⁴¹ Across all grantees, Consumer Debt Grant-funded cases mostly assisted women and people who identify as Hispanic/Latino or white.

(N=1,766 Consumer Debt Grant Clients)**





SUPPORT CENTER SERVICES

Two Consumer Debt grantees are SCs. During the reporting period, Consumer Debt Grant-funded SCs provided the following modes of assistance:

- **Training Events:** SCs held six training events with 205 attendees.
- **Consultation and Technical Assistance:** SCs provided brief (99) and in-depth (25) instances of technical assistance to QLSPs and non-QLSPs (12).
- **Meetings:** Meetings, such as stakeholder convenings, are important for SCs to learn about the latest updates in their specific areas of law and share those updates with QLSPs. During the reporting period, SCs organized or participated in a total of 28 meetings with 269 attendees.

RURAL AND UNDERSERVED COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Budget Act of 2022 also required funding preference be given to projects that proposed to serve rural and underserved communities. Grantees were asked to describe those services.

Rural Communities

Several grantees provided services to clients living in rural areas. Rural communities served include those in the counties of Butte, Imperial, Lompoc, Nevada, Plumas, San Benito, San Bernardino, Santa Cruz, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Marin, and Yuba, and rural areas of southeastern Alameda County, Antelope Valley area of Los Angeles County, coastal San Mateo County, and southern Santa Clara County. Grantees provided virtual and hybrid services and conducted in-person outreach and education efforts in specific rural communities, including know-your-rights trainings and presentations at community-based organizations.

Underserved Communities

Grantees continue to target project services to various underserved communities, including seniors, persons with disabilities, people of color, and individuals with limited English proficiency. In 2024, projects reported assisting seniors (44 percent), persons with disabilities (31 percent), and persons with limited language proficiency (19 percent). Some projects particularly focused on special groups, including victims of domestic violence and sexual assault or justice-involved adults.
