The following information outlines some of the many activities staff are engaged in to further the Judicial Council's strategic goals and priorities for the judicial branch. The report focuses on action since the council's December 2, 2022, meeting, and is exclusive of items on the January business meeting agenda.

Judicial Council Governing and Advisory Body Membership

The annual solicitation for applications to serve on the governing body of the Judicial Council were disseminated branchwide and to justice system partners. Nominations to fill three voting positions and three nonvoting positions are due by February 24, 2023. Appointments will have an effective date of September 15, 2023. Additionally, out-of-cycle appointments were made by the Chief Justice to nine advisory bodies, effective January 1, 2023.

Annual Year in Review

A <u>recap</u> of how the Judicial Council and courts around the state worked during 2022 to restore, maintain, and expand access to justice during the continuing pandemic was shared branchwide and posted on the Newsroom of the California Courts website.

Judicial Branch Budget

Following the release of the Governor's proposed budget for fiscal year 2023–24, a memorandum focusing on the proposal as it relates to the judicial branch was disseminated to court leadership and statewide conference calls were conducted to review specifics of the proposed budget. Council staff and court leadership also met with the Legislative Analyst's Office to address questions and provide information as the Legislature begins to consider the proposed budget.

Audit Services

An audit entrance conference was held with the Superior Court of Madera County in advance of onsite fieldwork in January. Audit Services is currently conducting seven trial court audits, in addition to coordinating with the State Controller's Office on its biennial audit of the Judicial Council.

Payroll System Deployment to New Court

Collaborating with the Judicial Council, the Superior Court of Mono County became the 19th court to adopt the Phoenix Human Resources Payroll System, supporting personnel management, benefits, time and accrual tracking, and payroll processing.

Diversity in Recruitment

Following a public request for proposals solicitation, Judicial Council Human Resources expanded its diversity recruitment efforts by making the services of the Professional Diversity Network available to the branch. The network works with many government groups and has partnerships with NAACP, the National Urban League, Women in Technology, and others to expand the diversity of the recruitment pool for the judicial branch.

Labor and Employee Relations

Labor negotiations assistance was provided to 18 trial courts on 24 matters. Services included side letter negotiations, impact bargaining, and successor memoranda of understanding negotiations. Support also was provided on 21 different labor and employee-related matters.

Temporary Assigned Judges Program: Civil Mediation Program

As part of the new Temporary Assigned Judges Civil Mediation Program launched in November, 2022, 30 assigned judges participated in the first civil mediation training session. The program was implemented to make retired judges available to serve as mediators at no additional cost to the parties or courts.

Statewide Pretrial Release Program

A meeting was held with representatives of the national initiative on Advancing Pretrial Research and Policy and the Chief Probation Officers of California to debrief on the six-part education series for pretrial practitioners held in 2022 and to discuss plans for 2023.

Expansion of Online Tool for Adjudicating Infraction Violations

Statewide expansion of the MyCitations application for online ability-to-pay determinations, as required by Assembly Bill 143, continued with two additional superior courts—Sierra and Trinity—launching the tool. Eighteen courts are now using the application: Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Monterey, Modoc, Mono, Placer, San Benito, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Shasta, Sierra, Trinity, Tulare, and Ventura.

Information Technology Modernization Projects

Following Judicial Council approval of the 2022–23 court technology modernization funding project allocations, intra-branch agreements were distributed to participating courts. The council's Information Technology staff is providing project management services to 41 courts for 101 projects.

Court Facilities

Nineteen real estate transactions were completed involving new or renewed leases and licenses, event licenses, and permits for court facilities in: Contra Costa, Fresno, Kern, Los Angeles, Mariposa, Merced, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Joaquin, San Mateo, Santa Clara, and Stanislaus Counties. A further 195 projects are in progress.

Community Assistance, Recovery and Empowerment (CARE) Court

Staff contributed to planning and content development for the first Community Assistance, Recovery and Empowerment (CARE) Act implementation meeting convened by the California Health and Human Services Agency to support the development of local partnerships between court leadership and behavioral health services.

Judicial Resources and Technical Assistance

File reviews of juvenile cases were conducted in the Superior Courts of Los Angeles, San Diego, and Shasta Counties to identify any legal issues and training needs.

implement the Racial Justice Act.

- Authorized expenditures of \$10.6 million for facilities modifications and an additional \$24,000 for security-related projects.
- Received updates on court-funded requests, maintenance performance, facility modification projects on hold, and the status of 2023–24 Intra-Branch Agreement renewals for courts that have been delegated facilities maintenance responsibilities by the Judicial Council.

Tribal Court-State Court Forum

• Reviewed a joint proposal with the Family and Juvenile Law Advisory Committee to allow tribal participation in juvenile cases not subject to the Indian Child Welfare Act.

Definitions:

Authorized Position (FTE) Authorized positions include all regular ongoing positions approved in the Budget Act for that year. The number is based on the position's approved full time equivalency.

Filled Authorized Position

Filled authorized positions are the number of authorized positions filled based on the employee's full time equivalency.

(FTE)

Headcount The actual count of persons employed by the Judicial Council, regardless of FTE. This number could be more than the FTE count due to part-time employees being counted as "1". This count does not include Judicial Council Temporary Employees (909) or

Employment Agency Temporary Workers.

Vacancy (FTE)

The number of vacancies is the number of authorized positions minus the number of filled authorized positions.

Vacancy Rate (FTE) Vacancy Rate is calculated by dividing the number of authorized positions by the number of vacant authorized positions. This number excludes temporary employees ("909" funded employees). See definition of temporary employees below.

Judicial Council Temporary

The "909 category is the State Controller code used to reference a temporary position or a temporary employee.

Employees (909)

909 Position - it is a position that may not be funded through the Budget Act and it is categorized by the Office of the State Controller as a temporary position used in the absence of an authorized position. 909 positions may be occupied by regular full-time employees due to the unavailability of an authorized vacant position. 909 Employee - An employee whose salary is not funded through the Budget Act. 909 employees may receive benefits if employed at least half-time and the term of employment is for more than six months. Types of "909" Temporary Employees include: Retired Annuitants: A retired annuitant is a retiree who is hired by his or her former employer or by another employer that participates in the same retirement system as the former employer. This includes a former participant in a state retirement system who has previously retired and who is currently receiving retirement benefits. Temporary: Employees employed on a temporary basis - they do not receive full benefits (but do receive CalPERS retirement service credit).

Employment Agency
Temporary Worker (FTE)

These are workers from an employment agency. They are employees of the employment agency that provide short-term support.

Contractor (FTE)

Individuals augmenting the work of the organization and providing services for a limited period of time or on a specific project, where a particular skill set is required that is either (1) not within an existing classification and/or job description or (2) where recruitment issues require the use of a contractor.

Full Time Equivalency (FTE)

Full Time Equivalency is the number of total maximum compensable hours designated in a year divided by actual hours worked in a year. For example, the work year is defined as 2,080 hours; one employee occupying a paid full time job all year would consume one FTE. One employee working for 1,040 hours each would consume .5 FTE.

Time Base

Full time: Employee is scheduled to work 40 hours per week. Receives full benefits.

Part time: Employee is scheduled to work less than 40 hours per week. Employees that work more than 20 hours per week receive full benefits.

Intermittent: Employees have no established work schedule and work on an as-needed basis that varies from one pay period to the next. Eligibility for certain benefits may be limited for these employees.

Regular Employee

Commonly referred to as "permanent employees" – They receive full benefits.

Limited Term

Limited Term Position – It is a position that is funded through the Budget Act with a specific end date. The position is counted as an authorized position. Employee in limited term positions may be regular or temporary.
