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Executive Summary

This report summarizes Judicial Council Court Innovations Grant Program activity for the second quarter of fiscal year 2020–21.

Relevant Previous Council Action

In March 2017, the Judicial Council awarded \$23.5 million in total grants for projects designed to improve court efficiency and increase the public's access to justice. The council also allocated \$625,000—out of the statutorily authorized \$1.25 million—for administration costs and retained 3 to 4 percent of each category's funding for unforeseen expenses incurred by grant-funded projects.

In June 2017, the council delegated to the Judicial Branch Budget Committee authority to decide whether to approve funding adjustments.¹ The delegation requires the Budget Committee to use the same criteria used in deciding the original awards and to report quarterly to the council about any authorized adjustments.

Analysis/Rationale

Budget adjustments

The Budget Committee approved one budget adjustment in the second quarter of fiscal year (FY) 2020–21:

- \$71,809.80 for the DUI and Restitution Court of the Superior Court of San Mateo County to provide additional drug testing kits and alcohol monitoring based on participant numbers.

Contingency fund balance

As of the date of this report, the balance of the contingency fund is \$1,307,967.28, allocated as follows:

- \$1,198,900.17 for collaborative court projects;
- \$17,753.11 for self-help, family, and juvenile court projects; and
- \$91,314.00 for other efficiency projects.

The Budget Committee will continue to monitor the contingency fund closely during the expenditure close-out phase and report on any changes.

Summary of findings

Of the 52 projects awarded grant funding, 49 projects are moving forward.² The amount awarded to the 52 projects totals just under \$22.9 million.³ As of the second quarter of FY 2020–21, a little over \$22.89 million has been distributed to the projects.⁴

Of the approximately \$22.89 million distributed to the awardee courts, almost \$21.1 million was expended by the awardees through FY 2020–21, quarter 2, with approximately \$1.07 million expended in quarter 2. To the extent feasible in the current environment, council staff continue to coordinate with awardee courts to view postimplementation project demonstrations and participate in project discussions. This engagement complements both the administration of the grant and future project-specific reporting. Council staff is also coordinating with awardee courts to finalize project expenditures, review and analyze data related to project outcome measurements, and receive project final reports.

Fiscal Impact and Policy Implications

The Budget Committee and council staff will review final project reports and continue to collect and review quarterly data related to project outcome goals, final expenditures, and implementation plans. Staff will also continue to work with the projects to help gauge the innovation, efficiency, accessibility, modernization, replicability, sustainability, and cost impact of each project. Judicial Council Audit Services staff will assist with monitoring the grant program by conducting periodic reviews of specific grant projects.
