AB 1058 Child Support Commissioner and Family Law Facilitator Program Funding for Fiscal Year 2024-25

AB 1058 Program History

- Originated with Governor's Child Support Task Force
- Assembly Bill 1058 Signed by Governor Pete Wilson in 1996

AB 1058 Program History

- Established the Child Support Commissioner (CSC) and Family Law Facilitator (FLF) Program
- Expedited the court process for families
- Made the process accessible and costeffective
- Allowed federal and state funds to be used for these cases

AB 1058 Program Requirements

- Child Support Commissioner Each court must have a highly trained subject matter expert child support commissioner to hear cases where local child support agencies are providing services.
- Family Law Facilitator Each court must have an experienced family law attorney to provide education, assistance completing forms and running child support calculations.

AB 1058 Program Funding

- Judicial Council Department of Child Support Services (DCSS) contract for funding
- Judicial Council allocates funding:
 - CSC Program Workload based methodology
 - FLF Program Population based methodology

AB 1058 Program Funding

- Court funding allocations for FY 2024–25
 - \$48 million available to the CSC program
 - \$15 million available to the FLF program

FY 23-24 CSC Program Services

- 2.8 million people served
- \$1.6 billion in current child support distributed
- 91 courtrooms in 69 locations used to hear Title IV-D matters

FY 2023–24 FLF Program Services

- 42,014 IV-D incidents of service
 - 27,533 Customers served in person (66%)
 - 14,481 Customers served remotely (34%)
- 1,115 Customers attending workshops

Who is served in the FLF office?

- Self-Represented Litigants
 - We serve both sides of the case.
 - Service are FREE no income limitations.

- Help with forms
 - Establishment of Child Support
 - Modification of Child Support
 - Responding to Governmental Complaints and Motions
 - Medical Reimbursement

- Educating the Parents
 - Explaining Court Process and Procedures
 - Providing information about how child support is calculated

- Educating the Parents (Cont.)
 - Providing information about how to serve the other parent
 - Explaining complex legal issues such as set asides, arrears determinations, and other equitable remedies

- Referrals for additional service
 - To LCSA: Genetic testing, arrears audit or Enforcement
 - To other agencies: Domestic Violence shelter, eviction help
 - To other Self-Help Workshops: Divorce, custody, trial prep
