Executive Summary

Penal Code section 13155 requires Judicial Council staff, commencing January 1, 2013, to collect information from trial courts regarding the implementation of the 2011 Criminal Justice Realignment legislation and make the data available annually to the California Department of Finance, Board of State and Community Corrections, and Joint Legislative Budget Committee by September 1. *Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2025)*, included as Attachment A to this report, includes statistics from January 1 through December 31, 2025, for each county regarding the dispositions of felonies at sentencing and petitions to revoke probation, mandatory supervision, postrelease community supervision, and parole.

Relevant Previous Reporting or Action

Each year, the annual report of the data collected from the trial courts on the implementation of the 2011 realignment is provided to the Judicial Council. The previous annual reports were provided at council meetings on August 23, 2013; August 22, 2014; August 21, 2015; August 26, 2016; September 14, 2017; November 30, 2018; May 17, 2019; May 14, 2020; May 20, 2021; May 10, 2022; May 12, 2023; July 12, 2024; and July 18, 2025. Each report was sent to the

California Department of Finance, Board of State and Community Corrections, and Joint Legislative Budget Committee by September 1 of that report year.

Analysis/Rationale

Development of data elements

The Judicial Council's Court Executives Advisory Committee formed an ad hoc working group to identify and define appropriate realignment-related data elements. The Criminal Justice Realignment Data Working Group was composed of representatives from the Superior Courts of Alameda, Fresno, Los Angeles, Napa, Orange, Shasta, and Ventura Counties. The working group implemented quarterly reporting requirements and identified 29 data elements necessary to track sentencing, disposition information, and court workload. After receiving feedback from the trial courts, various data elements were adjusted and new data elements created to better track outcomes and court workload. These changes were implemented in the fourth quarter of calendar year 2013; no changes have been made since then. A list of current data elements is included as Attachment B.

Data collection and quality assurance

Trial courts submit data quarterly to the Judicial Council's Criminal Justice Services office using an online survey. The data reporting schedule for 2025 was as follows:

- Quarter 1 (January 1–March 31) data due April 30
- Quarter 2 (April 1–June 30) data due July 31
- Quarter 3 (July 1–September 30) data due October 31
- Quarter 4 (October 1–December 31) data due January 31, 2026

Judicial Council staff conduct quality assurance to examine the accuracy and reliability of the data collected. Staff members review reported data biannually and contact trial courts to discuss data quality, provide technical assistance regarding data collection, and gather information about local court processes. Data quality has continued to improve because of this cooperative effort and as the courts continue to refine their data reporting systems. The data presented in *Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2025)* may be amended in subsequent reports if courts revise previous data entries.

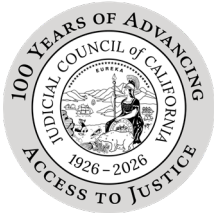
Courts facing the greatest limitations have been instructed to prioritize items directly linked to the Criminal Justice Realignment allocation methodology (e.g., petitions to revoke/modify postrelease community supervision and petitions to revoke/modify parole). The totals presented in this statistical report may vary from those in the Judicial Branch Statistical Information System (JBSIS) or the annual *Court Statistics Report* because of differences in reporting timelines. A subset of the data elements is also posted on [an interactive dashboard](#) on the California Courts website.

Fiscal Impact and Policy Implications

In addition to fulfilling a legislative mandate, data collected under Penal Code section 13155 are used to assist the Judicial Council Trial Court Budget Advisory Committee in determining realignment funding allocations. Approximately \$106.1 million has been allocated since fiscal year (FY) 2013–14, including \$9.2 million in FY 2025–26. The current allocation formula is based on each court’s proportion of the new workload associated with realignment, as measured by the total petitions filed to revoke or modify postrelease community supervision and parole, or both. All courts are able to report the data elements currently used to establish funding allocations.

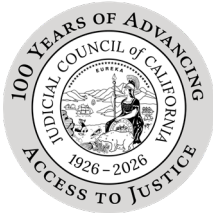

Statutory citation: Penal Code section 13155

The Judicial Council has submitted a report to the Legislature in accordance with Penal Code section 13155.

The following summary of the report is provided under the requirements of Government Code section 9795.

This is the 14th annual Judicial Council report on the implementation of the 2011 Criminal Justice Realignment. This report includes statistics from January 1 through December 31, 2025, for each county regarding the dispositions of felonies at sentencing and petitions to revoke probation, mandatory supervision, postrelease community supervision, and parole.

Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2025)

This report fulfills the requirement under Penal Code section 13155 that the Judicial Council submit data regarding the implementation of the 2011 Criminal Justice Realignment legislation to the California Department of Finance, the Board of State and Community Corrections, and the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.

Please note the following:

- The data presented in Tables 1 through 5 reflect the annual total of each item for all quarters reported by each court to the Judicial Council. The reporting period is calendar year 2025 (January 1–December 31). This information may be revised and amended for subsequent data reporting corrections or to complete partially entered reports, if any, but is current as of **March 6, 2026**. The reporting schedule for 2025 was as follows:
 - **Quarter 1:** January 1–March 31 (data due April 30)
 - **Quarter 2:** April 1–June 30 (data due July 31)
 - **Quarter 3:** July 1–September 30 (data due October 31)
 - **Quarter 4:** October 1–December 31 (data due January 31, 2026)
- Approximately 90 percent of the courts were able to report most (70 percent or more) of the requested data elements. Due to local case processing practices and data availability, some of the trial court data are difficult to aggregate at the state level. Judicial Council staff work with local courts to identify issues related to specific data elements to improve overall data reporting over time. The following notations are used for courts reporting partial data:
 - a = Reported three quarters of data.
 - b = Reported two quarters of data.
 - c = Reported one quarter of data.
- Note that the sample size (n) for each data element is the total number of courts reporting any data for that item, including courts reporting fewer than four quarters. Please see Attachment B for a full description of each data element.
