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# **Executive Summary**

The Budget Act of 2022 included appropriations to be distributed by the Judicial Council to the Legal Services Trust Fund Commission, which were then awarded by the commission as grants to legal services programs in these areas: (1) Interest on Lawyers' Trust Accounts Formula Grants, Partnership Grants, and Consumer Debt Grants; (2) Homelessness Prevention Grants funded by the federal Coronavirus Fiscal Recovery Fund of 2021; and (3) Homelessness Prevention Grants funded by the state General Fund. The State Bar of California was also directed to provide to the Judicial Council an annual report on the allocations, expenditures, and outcomes of these programs, and the Judicial Council is required to provide that report to the California Department of Finance. The Judicial Council submitted this report to the Department of Finance on December 29, 2023, in the form of the three separate program reports.

# **Relevant Previous Council Action**

On September 20, 2022, the Judicial Council approved the fiscal year 2022–23 distributions of Equal Access Fund monies to the Legal Services Trust Fund Commission to be awarded as grants to legal services providers and support centers to provide civil legal services to indigent persons, as allocated in the Budget Act of 2022 (Sen. Bill 154; Stats. 2022, ch. 43) (Link A). The approved distributions were:

• \$35 million for Interest on Lawyers' Trust Accounts (IOLTA) Formula Grants and Partnership Grants (Link B) and \$15 million for Consumer Debt Grants (Link C);

- \$20 million for Homelessness Prevention Grants from the federal Coronavirus Fiscal Recovery Fund of 2021 (Link D); and
- \$30 million for Homelessness Prevention Grants from the state General Fund (Link C).

# Analysis/Rationale

The Budget Act of 2022 included requirements that the State Bar of California annually report to the Judicial Council on the funding allocations, annual expenditures, and program outcomes for all Equal Access Fund and federal funding allocations. Also under the Budget Act, the Judicial Council provides the reports to the Department of Finance by January 1 of each year for the prior fiscal year. The reports submitted to the Department of Finance on December 29, 2023, are included as Attachment A, *Equal Access Fund Evaluation Report*, Attachment B, *Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds Report: Preventing Homelessness Through Legal Services*, and Attachment C, *Equal Access Funds Report: Preventing Homelessness Through Legal Services*. Highlights of program outcomes are summarized below.

## Equal Access Fund Evaluation Report

## IOLTA Formula Grants and Partnership Grants

During the reporting period of January 1 through December 31, 2022, 1 more than 35,000 attorney-client cases were closed among 81 IOLTA Formula grantees. The majority of closed cases concerned housing, immigration, or domestic violence. The main legal benefits included obtaining access to housing, enforcing rights to safe and habitable housing, obtaining citizenship or lawful permanent residency, and obtaining temporary restraining orders. The main economic benefits included back awards, lump-sum awards, settlements, monthly benefits, and reduction or elimination of claimed amounts. The main economic benefits included \$28.5 million recovered and \$15.6 million saved for clients.

Partnership Grants funded 36 court-based projects that provided self-help services to self-represented litigants in 18 superior courts. Most self-help services were related to housing, family law, and domestic violence.

#### Consumer Debt Grants

The purpose of the Consumer Debt Grants is to provide indigent persons with legal services related to consumer debt matters affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. During the reporting period of January 1 through June 30, 2023, more than 250 attorney-client cases were closed among 20 grantees.

# Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds Report: Preventing Homelessness Through Legal Services

This report covers Homelessness Prevention Grants funded by the federal Coronavirus Fiscal Recovery Fund of 2021 for the period of July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023, for legal services providers and support centers to provide indigent persons with legal services for housing-related matters, including eviction defense, tenant defense assistance in landlord-tenant rental disputes, and homeowner foreclosure prevention. During the reporting period, 62 grantees assisted approximately 12,000 indigent persons through attorney-client relationships. Outcomes of closed cases included nearly \$10.2 million in one-time payments to and savings by clients, and nearly \$900,000 in ongoing monthly payments to and savings by clients.

# Equal Access Funds Report: Preventing Homelessness Through Legal Services

This report covers Homelessness Prevention Grants funded by the state General Fund for the period of January 1 through June 30, 2023, during which 36 grantees assisted over 1,800 indigent persons with homelessness prevention legal services through attorney-client relationships. Outcomes of closed cases included over \$1.4 million in combined one-time payments to and savings by clients, and over \$41,000 in ongoing monthly payments to and savings by clients.

# **Fiscal Impact and Policy Implications**

The programs described in these reports assist the judicial branch in implementing Goal I of the *Strategic Plan for California's Judicial Branch*—Access, Fairness, Diversity, and Inclusion—by increasing representation for low-income persons.

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# 2022–2023 Equal Access Fund Report

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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

In 1999, the California Legislature established the Equal Access Fund (EAF), with the goal "to improve equal access and the fair administration of justice." Since its inception, EAF has grown significantly from its initial appropriation of \$10 million in 1999 to an appropriation of \$58 million in 2022.

A study on access to justice conducted by the State Bar in 2019 revealed that in a given year, more than half of Californians experience civil legal issues but receive no help, or inadequate help, for 85 percent of these problems. Due to this justice gap, a significant proportion of Californians are not receiving much-needed legal assistance. EAF is critical to legal aid and providing access to justice for vulnerable Californians who are unable to afford an attorney. Legal aid intervention helps Californians remain in their homes, maintain employment, improve health outcomes, and become better advocates for themselves.

In 2022, the State Bar awarded EAF grants to 81 nonprofit organizations whose primary purpose is to provide free civil legal services to indigent people in California and 22 nonprofit organizations whose primary purpose is to provide legal training, legal technical assistance, or advocacy support to the organizations that provide direct legal services to indigent people. Organizations that provide direct legal services are called Qualified Legal Service Projects (QLSPs) and organizations that support QLSPs are called support centers (SCs). Recipients of EAF grants must use the funds to support an identified set of activities with measurable outcomes.

EAF<sup>1</sup> is distributed in two parts: (1) 90 percent of the funds are distributed according to the statutory Interest on Lawyers' Trust Accounts (IOLTA) formula<sup>2</sup> as EAF-IOLTA grants and (2) 10 percent of the funds are distributed as Partnership Grants—discretionary grants for joint projects between courts and legal service programs to provide legal assistance at or near courthouses to pro per litigants. Unlike the EAF-IOLTA grants that are distributed to IOLTA-eligible organizations through a statutory formula based on qualified and county expenditures, Partnership Grants are awarded through a competitive process. EAF-IOLTA and Partnership Grants are typically awarded over a one-year period commencing January 1.

In addition to annual EAF-IOLTA and Partnership Grant disbursements, the State Budget Act of 2022 (Budget Act) included a one-time appropriation of \$15 million in Equal Access Funds to be distributed as grants to QLSPs and SCs to provide civil legal services for indigent Californians related to consumer debt matters affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, with special preference to projects serving rural and underserved communities. Consumer Debt grants are three-year grants, with the grant period beginning on January 1, 2023.

Pursuant to reporting requirements under the Budget Act, this report provides an overview of expenditures, services, and outcomes achieved, and highlights the impact of EAF-IOLTA and Partnership Grant funds during the reporting period of January 1—December 31, 2022, and Consumer Debt Grant funds during the reporting period of January 1—June 30, 2023.

# **Key Findings**

- EAF-IOLTA grantees assisted a total of 42,980 indigent Californians.
- EAF-IOLTA grantees closed a total 35,128 cases, most of which were in the areas of housing, immigration, and domestic violence.
- Grantees recovered over \$28.5 million for clients through back awards, lump sum awards, settlements, or monthly benefits.
- Grantees saved \$15.6 million for clients by reducing or eliminating amounts that clients would have otherwise owed.
- EAF-IOLTA grantees assisted 353,600 indigent Californians with other services, including self-help clinics, educational workshops and trainings, outreach events, and hotline calls.
- Partnership Grant projects provided 23,554 individuals with information on substantive legal options. Most Partnership Grant projects used remote services for self-represented litigants (SRLs) in one-on-one services and group-setting services. This is a significant change in the service delivery model, as remote services were not regularly used in prior years.
- In the first six months of its three-year grant period, Consumer Debt Grant-funded organizations closed 253 cases for indigent Californians. Through these cases, projects were able to save clients at least \$603,022 and recover at least \$23,046 for clients.
- Consumer Debt Grant-funded projects also assisted 3,346 indigent Californians through other services, including self-help clinics, educational workshops, and outreach events.

# **EQUAL ACCESS FUND GRANTS (IOLTA-FORMULA)**

This section details the expenditures, services, and outcomes achieved by EAF-IOLTA grants from January 1, 2022-December 31, 2022.

#### **EXPENDITURES**

For the 2022 grant year, the State Bar distributed \$58.06 million in EAF-IOLTA grants to 103 grantees (81 QLSPs and 22 SCs). In 2022, grantees spent \$41.59 million<sup>3</sup> of the EAF-IOLTA distribution.

Notably, grantees used the EAF-IOLTA monies to increase staff salaries and benefits. This is significant because increasing compensation directly impacts an organization's ability to recruit and retain staff, which enables it to maintain a high level of service delivery for its clients.

#### **CASES CLOSED**

Grantees reported on 35,128 EAF-IOLTA-funded closed cases<sup>4</sup> for individuals with low income, seniors, and individuals with developmental disabilities<sup>5</sup> in California in 2022.

#### **Level of Service and Number of Services**

Across all areas of law, case services provided for EAF-IOLTA-funded activities were mainly through counsel and advice (16,126) and limited-action matters (8,651).<sup>6</sup>

Most cases closed were in the areas of housing (8,363), immigration (5,971), and domestic violence (4,406).

- Housing matters include federally subsidized housing rights, foreclosure or title fraud, landlord-tenant (including foreclosure evictions), public housing, and homelessness.
- Immigration matters include naturalization, asylum, adjustment of status, citizenship, family petition, and trafficking T and U nonimmigrant-status visas.
- Domestic violence matters include abuse perpetrated against any of the individuals identified in the Domestic Violence Protection Act, California Family Code section 6211.

#### **Case Outcomes: Main and Economic Benefits**

Grantees reported on main benefits (outcomes from a legal issue) and economic benefits (financial award or savings for the client)<sup>9</sup> achieved for each EAF–IOLTA-funded case closed during the reporting period. These main and economic benefits were developed through a collaborative process with the legal services organizations and synthesize the most common goals of legal services in different case types. Main benefits are outcomes that frequently cannot be quantified in economic benefits, such as clients being able to stay housed, having access to quality and affordable health, and obtaining other legal protections.

Across all areas of law, grantees reported 19,729 benefits, resulting in \$28.5 million recovered and \$15.6 million saved for clients.

The highest number of benefits achieved were reported in the areas of law of immigration (4,080), family/domestic violence (3,888), and housing (3,712).

- Immigration included prevention of deportation and obtaining citizenship or lawful permanent residency.
- Family/domestic violence included obtaining protection from abuse or neglect; obtaining, preserving, or increasing child support; and obtaining a temporary restraining order under the Domestic Violence Prevention Act.
- Housing included obtaining access to housing, enforcing rights to safe and habitable housing, and obtaining relief from foreclosure or property scam.

From January 1 to December 31, 2022, grantees recovered over \$28.2 million for clients through back awards, lump sum awards, settlement awards, or monthly benefits in the areas of consumer/finance (\$8.4 million), immigration (\$7.6 million), and family/domestic violence (\$3.0 million).

- Consumer/finance economic benefits recovered for clients include amounts recovered for creditors and amounts of any cash settlement or judgment.
- Family/domestic violence economic benefits recovered for clients include orders for monthly amount for child or spousal support over a set amount of time.

# Cases Closed: Client Demographics<sup>14</sup>


For all EAF-IOLTA closed cases, grantees reported on demographic information collected for clients served, in categories such as gender, race and ethnicity, and age. EAF-IOLTA cases mostly assisted women and clients who identify as Hispanic.

## **EAF-IOLTA Grants Cases Closed: Gender**

For the reporting period, EAF-IOLTA closed cases served more women (60 percent) than men (34 percent) and those who identify as nonbinary (0.5 percent).


Figure 2. Gender (N=34,694 EAF-IOLTA Grants Cases Closed)

#### **OTHER SERVICES**

In addition to receiving case assistance, grantees provide other services in instances where no attorney-client relationship is formed through self-help clinics, educational workshops, outreach events, and hotline calls. Grantees continually try to address the justice gap through these other services. For example, in self-help clinics and educational workshops, can ask questions and gain a basic understanding about their civil legal issues, enabling them to feel empowered and more confident in the legal system. In outreach events, grantees frequently engage with community partners, which can be impactful in reaching vulnerable communities and connecting people to more integrated services.

From January 1–December 31, 2022, EAF-IOLTA-funded grantees provided 22,918 other services to 353,600<sup>15</sup> people.

- Most self-help clinics were held in the areas of conservatorship (244), domestic violence (196), and guardianship (192).
- Most educational workshops and trainings were held in the areas of disability rights (299), immigration (141), and housing (114).
- Most outreach events were held in the areas of employment (219), housing (105), and disability rights (99).
- Most hotline calls were for issues involving immigration (6,384), domestic violence (3,645), and family (2,368).

#### **SUPPORT CENTER SERVICES**

Approximately 20 percent of EAF-IOLTA grantees are SCs.<sup>16</sup> The primary purpose of SCs is to provide legal training, legal technical assistance, or advocacy support to the organizations that provide direct legal services to indigent people. SCs are subject-matter experts that keep up with the latest developments in the law and help distill it for direct service providers to put into practice. They also advocate and help shape the law, to benefit vulnerable communities.

During the reporting period, EAF-IOLTA-funded SCs provided the following modes of assistance:

# **Training Events**

SCs held a total of 292 training events across 11 areas of law. Most trainings were focused on health and long-term care (89), immigration (67), and housing (57).

# Meetings

Meetings, such as stakeholder convenings, are important for SCs to learn about the latest updates in their specific areas of law and share those updates with QLSPs. During the reporting period, SCs organized or participated in a total of 1,056 meetings. Meetings with the most QLSP attendees were in the areas of housing, employment, and health and long-term care.

#### **LANGUAGE ACCESS**

During the reporting period, the language other than English that was most used to provide services was Spanish. After Spanish, Mandarin and Cantonese were the most frequently needed for language assistance.

Grantees also reported having a total 894 bilingual staff and volunteers, of which 512 were funded by EAF-IOLTA funds. For language assistance beyond staff expertise, grantees used interpreters or translation services, or worked with community partners.

### **IMPACT OF COVID-19 PANDEMIC**

Most grantees indicated that the pandemic had a significant impact both on service delivery and staff during the reporting period. For EAF-IOLTA activities, most grantees decreased inperson events, experienced staffing issues, and indicated that outcomes were impacted by limited access to technology.

#### **PARTNERSHIP GRANTS**

This section covers expenditures and outcomes achieved by Partnership Grant projects from January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022. During this reporting period, 51 Partnership Grant projects were funded. <sup>19</sup>

Partnership Grants require legal aid organizations to collaborate with court-based self-help centers to expand services available to low-income self-represented litigants (SRLs). Through this relationship, legal aid organizations and courts leverage their respective expertise and experience to identify and develop solutions to help address challenges faced by those who have low income. Another benefit of Partnership Grants is that they help streamline and make court processes more efficient, enabling more SRLs to be served.

#### **EXPENDITURES**

For the 2022 grant year, the State Bar distributed \$6.46 million<sup>20</sup> to fund 51 Partnership Grant projects. As of December 31, 2022, projects reported spending \$3.55 million.

#### **PROJECT SERVICES**

Grantees reported on project services provided across all sources of funding. Although more than half of the Partnership Grant projects are funded by additional funding sources, the reported numbers below reflect services funded by Partnership Grants only. In order to determine what portion of services are attributed to Partnership Grant funding, a pro-rata amount was calculated by dividing Partnership Grant expenses by current expenditures for the entire project. Services provided under the Partnership Grants are in addition to the self-help other services funded by EAF-IOLTA.

• The top three focus areas were housing (21), family (18), and domestic violence and civil harassment (17).

- Across all projects, SRLs sought the most assistance in obtaining information on substantive legal options, (23,554), general court processes and procedures (17,483), and document preparation and/or review (13,170).
- In addition to providing one-on-one services<sup>21</sup> to SRLs, Partnership Grant projects held 1,631 workshops, which assisted 8,573 individuals.

# **Project and Court Coordination**

Project and court staff collaborated closely to launch clinics, coordinate services, evaluate effectiveness, and troubleshoot challenges. These coordination efforts led to improvements such as developing new intake and evaluation forms and enabling project staff to tap into court networks for outreach purposes. In addition, staff from court self-help centers and law libraries were able to focus on other customers and assist more people than they would have otherwise.

## **Key Changes to Projects**

In order to improve project effectiveness and adapt to challenges, grantees made updates to project staff, implemented process improvements, and adjusted services to meet community needs in 2022. Staff changes included creating new supervisor attorney positions to oversee remote services and adding part-time attorney support for existing project staff. In terms of process improvements, some grantees reported using SurveyMonkey to measure litigant satisfaction, implemented more robust data tracking, and replaced paper processes with electronic processes. In order to meet community need, some projects shifted from in-person clinics to one-on-one remote assistance, physically moved to new spaces such as the public library, and adjusted clinic content to meet demand.

# **Litigant Satisfaction**

Survey responses revealed that a majority of SRLs were satisfied with the services provided, with some projects reporting 100 percent satisfaction from litigants. Most SRLs agreed that the services met their needs, they were satisfied with the help received, and they felt more prepared after attending the clinic or receiving assistance. Some grantees inferred from informal anecdotal feedback that the SRLs they assisted were better able to pursue or conclude their litigation successfully and efficiently.

In addition to satisfaction surveys, grantees evaluated project services through courtroom observations, in-person interviews, case review, and focus groups. These additional methods confirmed the high demand and value of services.

## **Reasons for Not Meeting Goals**

Grantees cited various factors preventing them from meeting 2022 project goals, which include continued challenges with staff recruitment and retention resulting in limited paid and volunteered staff to provide planned services, challenges promoting services due to the ongoing pandemic, and difficulty predicting demand.

During the reporting period, the language other than English most used to provide Partnership Grant project services was Spanish. After Spanish, Mandarin and Korean were the most frequently needed for language assistance.

#### **IMPACT OF COVID-19 PANDEMIC**

More than half of the Partnership Grant projects reported being impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Impacts included staffing challenges (28), a decrease in the number of in-person events (27), and an increase in time spent on cases/client hours (27). Grantees also had issues administering both in-person and virtual service delivery models, due to SRLs' safety concerns and technology-related challenges.

#### **CONSUMER DEBT GRANT**

This section covers expenditures and outcomes achieved by Consumer Debt Grant-funded projects from January 1, 2023 to June 30, 2023.

Consumer Debt Grants fund civil legal services for indigent persons related to consumer debt matters affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. These matters include debt collection, wage garnishment, or bank account levy defense, financial abuse related to consumer debt, protection against unfair debt collection practices, and other debt matters including those related to student loans, auto loans, and credit cards.

#### **EXPENDITURES**

In the first six months of 2023, projects spent \$1.58 million.<sup>26</sup>

#### **CASES CLOSED**

Grantees reported on 253 Consumer Debt Grant-funded closed cases provided to individuals with low income, seniors, and people with developmental disabilities in California during the first six months of 2023.


# Cases Closed: Client Demographics<sup>34</sup>

For all 253 Consumer Debt Grant-funded closed cases, grantees reported on demographic information collected for clients served, in categories including gender, race and ethnicity, and age. 


Figure 5. Race and Ethnicity (N=253 Consumer Debt Grant Closed Cases)

#### **SUPPORT CENTER SERVICES**

Two Consumer Debt grantees are SCs. During the reporting period, Consumer Debt Grantfunded SCs provided the following modes of assistance:

- **Training Events:** SCs held four training events with 120 attendees.
- Consultation and Technical Assistance: SCs provided brief (10) and in-depth (3) instances of technical assistance to QLSPs and non-QLSPs (7).
- Meetings: Meetings, such as stakeholder convenings, are important for SCs to learn about the latest updates in their specific areas of law and share those updates with QLSPs. During the reporting period, SCs organized or participated in a total of 14 meetings with 136 attendees.

#### **RURAL AND UNDERSERVED COMMUNITY SERVICES**

The Budget Act of 2022 also required funding preference be given to projects that proposed to serve rural and underserved communities; grantees were asked to describe those services.

#### **Rural Communities**

Several grantees tracked and identified the number of clients living in rural areas. Rural communities served include those in the counties of Imperial, Stanislaus, San Benito, San Bernardino, Santa Cruz, and Marin, and rural areas of Antelope Valley, coastal San Mateo County, and southern Santa Clara County. Grantees also held virtual and in-person outreach and education efforts in specific rural communities, including know-your-rights trainings, tabling efforts, and fliers.

#### **Underserved Communities**

Grantees continue to target project services to various underserved communities, including seniors, persons with disabilities, people of color, and individuals with limited English proficiency. In the first six months of the grants, based on client demographic data reported, projects reported assisting seniors (44 percent) and persons with disabilities (39 percent).

**Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds Report: Preventing Homelessness Through Legal Services** 

Reporting Period: July 1, 2022–June 30, 2023

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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

On a single night in 2022, California reported having 171,521 homeless individuals.<sup>1</sup> Countless more Californians were at risk of homelessness. Despite often having legal solutions, many civil legal problems contribute to homelessness. These are legal issues like eviction, foreclosure, loss of public benefits, and domestic violence. Shrinking, solving, and avoiding these issues is an important part of California's approach to preventing homelessness.

The Budget Acts of 2021 and 2022 allocated \$40 million and \$20 million, respectively, in federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds for homelessness prevention legal aid. These were the first two installments—of three—of \$80 million in federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds for homelessness prevention legal aid over three years for these grants. After administrative costs, 75 percent of the funding was for formula grants and 25 percent was for competitive grants. Eligibility for both grants was limited to qualified legal services projects (QLSPs), nonprofits whose primary purpose is to provide civil legal aid to indigent Californians, and to support centers, nonprofits whose primary purpose is to provide legal training, technical assistance, and advocacy support to QLSPs.<sup>2</sup>

This report covers twelve months of funding and services, from July 1, 2022, to June 30, 2023. Grantees continued to implement projects that began on December 1, 2021, for formula grants, and on January 1, 2022, for competitive grants.<sup>3</sup> Grantees provided or enabled homelessness prevention legal aid to thousands of economically vulnerable Californians. During the twelve-month reporting period, grantees:

Eviction defense, other tenant defense assistance in landlord-tenant rental disputes, or services to prevent foreclosure for homeowners, including pre-eviction and eviction legal services, counseling, advice and consultation, mediation, training, renter education, and representation, and legal services to improve habitability, increasing affordable housing, ensuring receipt of eligible income or benefits to improve housing stability, legal help for persons displaced because of domestic violence, and homelessness prevention.

- Addressed 12,812 homelessness prevention legal needs (HP needs) through attorneyclient relationships<sup>4,5</sup> for approximately 12,003 unique clients. Grantees helped over 28,187 household members across all HP needs addressed.<sup>6</sup>
- Recovered more than \$5.9 million for clients through lump-sum and monthly payments.<sup>7</sup>
- Attained more than \$5.1 million in lump-sum and monthly cost savings for clients.
- Provided more than 72,000 individuals with nonrepresentation legal help, including 7,380 hotline calls, 481 outreach events, 620 legal workshops/trainings, and 170 self-representation clinics.
- Provided support center services to more than 16,000 individuals including 181 live and on-demand trainings, 30 convenings, and 1,234 instances of research and other technical assistance.<sup>8</sup>

Approximately 78 percent of the total HP needs addressed related to housing law. The remaining HP needs addressed related to obtaining public benefits, safety from domestic violence, and other ways of preventing homelessness.

parameters. Notwithstanding this preference, the percent of rural and rural-urban HP needs addressed was equal for both formula and competitive grants (24 percent combined).<sup>13</sup>

In addition to some rural communities, other underserved populations also benefited from these funds. Californians with a disability accounted for 40 percent of total clients served whose HP needs were addressed. Seniors accounted for 30 percent of clients whose HP needs were addressed; clients with limited English proficiency accounted for 16 percent; and veterans accounted for 6 percent.

#### **DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS**

The Judicial Council of California distributed Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds through the State Bar's Legal Services Trust Fund Commission. The Budget Acts provided for administrative costs of up to 2.5 percent. After administrative costs, 75 percent of the funding went to formula grants and 25 percent to competitive grants.<sup>14</sup>

Grantees could receive both a formula and a competitive grant.<sup>15</sup> Formula grants started on December 1, 2021, and end on December 31, 2024 (37 months). Competitive grants started on January 1, 2022, and end on December 31, 2024 (36 months). The Legal Services Trust Fund Commission made awards using \$80 million expected over three years.

Each eligible program shall receive a percentage equal to that legal services project's 2021 IOLTA allocation divided by the total 2021 IOLTA allocation for all legal services projects eligible for this funding, except that to ensure meaningful funding is provided, a minimum amount of \$50,000 shall be allocated to each eligible program unless the program requests a lesser amount, in which case the additional funds shall be distributed proportionally to the other qualified legal services projects.

#### **DATA COLLECTION**

For each distinct legal problem giving rise to an attorney-client relationship, grantees reported the:

- HP need addressed (verified or not verified);
- Economic benefits (payments to and costs saved for) clients;
- Highest level of legal service;
- Client geography (county and zip code);
- Client demographics; and
- Household size.

Grantees often help the same client with multiple legal issues, such as eviction, unsafe housing, and loss of income. Sometimes multiple issues arise in a single case. Although client-level data was collected, reporting on total clients or cases, therefore, can understate the full extent of grantees' services.

To better capture the amount and types of services provided, this report focuses on homelessness prevention legal needs (i.e., HP needs) addressed. Grantees reported 12,812 HP needs addressed with legal advice or representation. The number of unique clients was approximately 12,003. Th

Grantees also reported on self-representation clinics, trainings, workshops, and hotline calls. For these nonrepresentation services to clients, grantees reported only the area of law and total people served. More than 72,000 participants benefited from these other services.<sup>18</sup>


Support centers reported on legal trainings, technical assistance, and advocacy support to QLSPs and other organizations. More than 16,000 participants benefited from these support center services.<sup>19</sup>


Figure 1. HP Needs Addressed by Gender N= 12,812.

Figure 2. HP Needs Addressed by Race/Ethnicity N= 12,812.




## Race/Ethnicity

#### Age

Most of the HP needs addressed were for clients between the ages of 18 and 59. Seniors accounted for just under onethird.

#### **Underserved Communities**

Projects with a focus on serving underserved communities received a preference for competitive funding. Grantees reported client demographics including limited English proficiency, disability, active-duty military status, and veteran status. Grantees were especially effective at serving clients with disabilities.

#### **Urban versus Rural Services**

Grantees closed cases in 56 of California's 58 counties. While projects that serve rural communities received a preference for competitive funding, the percent of rural and rural-urban HP needs addressed was equal for both formula and competitive grants (24 percent combined). The following table compares HP needs addressed to the population eligible for services—those who live at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty threshold.<sup>22</sup>

## Race/Ethnicity by County Type

People of color accounted for at least 34 percent of the HP needs addressed in rural areas and at least 52 percent in rural-urban areas. In urban-rural and urban areas, people of color accounted for at least 64 and 72 percent of the HP needs addressed, respectively.

# ATTORNEY-CLIENT RELATIONSHIPS: VERIFIED OUTCOMES, AREAS OF LAW, AND LEVELS OF SERVICE

Grantees reported the highest level of service for each HP need addressed and whether they could verify success. Inability to verify success does not always mean that the service was unsuccessful. Rather, it often means that the grantee lacked information about its success.

Grantees reported 4,544 verified outcomes and 8,268 unverified ones. Unverified outcomes were often HP needs where grantees provided legal advice or limited representation. Since those services can be brief, the grantees were sometimes unable to confirm whether the service succeeded.

#### **Housing and Income Maintenance Outcomes**

Among the 4,544 verified outcomes, over 70 percent were related to obtaining housing, preserving housing, or enforcing housing rights. Grantees also reported other outcomes that promoted housing stability, such as obtaining, preserving, or increasing public benefits.

## **Areas of Law**

Over three-quarters of the HP needs addressed fell under housing (e.g., landlord-tenant) law. Grantees also reported HP needs addressed in income maintenance, immigration, domestic violence, and other areas of law related to homelessness prevention.

#### **Levels of Service**

Legal advice was the highest level of service for most of the HP needs addressed. After limited action, in-depth services such as representation in agency decisions, court decisions, settlements, and extensive services accounted for approximately 21 percent of the HP needs addressed. This work can take considerable time to perform. As a result, it tends to reach fewer clients and might have been ongoing when the reporting period closed.<sup>29</sup>

#### ATTORNEY-CLIENT RELATIONSHIPS: MONETARY AWARDS AND SAVINGS

Data about monetary awards and savings is available in limited circumstances. Grantees that were able to do so reported these economic benefits when they were calculable and confirmed. An example of a calculable savings is waiver of back rent. Many homelessness prevention services (e.g., eviction defense and know-your-rights trainings) are not easily calculable awards or savings.

In the table below, lump-sum payments and savings are those for which the grantee could calculate the total over time. For example, \$100 per month for six months would be a lump sum of \$600. Monthly payments and savings are those that will continue on a monthly basis for an unknown period of time. For those benefits, grantees report just the monthly amount without estimating how long it will last.

## **SUPPORT CENTER SERVICES**

Fifteen support centers received competitive and formula grants. While support centers can report addressing HP needs with an attorney-client relationship, they primarily provide legal training, technical assistance, and advocacy support to QLSPs—rather than indigent clients. Some of this work (e.g., trainings) is captured in the "Other Services" section of this report.

Most of the work done by support centers focuses on supporting QLSPs. To capture this important work, the State Bar required support centers to report on trainings, convenings, and research and technical assistance provided to QLSPs and others.<sup>30</sup>

**Trainings:** Support centers held legal trainings and workshops for QLSPs, other community-based organizations, and the public on a range of homelessness prevention law issues. Most events related to housing law topics such as eviction moratoria. During the reporting period, support centers held a total of 181 live and on-demand training events across seven areas of law. Most trainings focused on housing (133), juvenile law (19), and health and long-term care (18).

**Convenings:** Support centers participated in meetings with QLSPs, other community-based organizations, and government agencies to evaluate and guide developments in homelessness prevention law. These meetings were related to local and statewide housing laws, public benefits, disability rights, and protecting affordable housing. During the reporting period, support centers held a total of 32 convenings, the majority of which focused on housing (94 percent).

Research and technical assistance: Support centers provided substantive law and project design and evaluation consultation to QLSPs and community advocates. Support centers did this through consultations, resource libraries, and other written materials. Areas that research technical assistance addressed included tenants' rights, mobile homeowners' rights, and public benefits. During the reporting period, support centers provided 1,234 instances of research assistance and technical support across seven areas of law. The most assistance was provided in housing law with 459 instances of brief technical assistance to QLSPs and 441 instances of technical assistance to non-QLSPs.

Additionally, support centers provided policy and advocacy support in partnership with QLSPs. The advocacy support was in housing, immigration, disability, and health law, among other areas of law. These advocacy activities included:

- Advocated for the enforcement of laws to protect tenants;
- Participated on a task force to publicize guidelines and conduct research on evictions;
- Engaged in administrative advocacy to advance homelessness prevention goals for older adults; and

• Provided comments on proposed changes to laws to ensure the prohibition of discrimination against domestic violence survivors.

#### **IMPACT OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC**

Grantees reported that the COVID-19 pandemic affected the delivery of legal aid. Most grantees (66 percent) had yet to resume their pre-COVID-19 frequency of in-person events. Over one-third of grantees reported court and/or agency backlogs impacted the amount of time to obtain outcomes for clients. Overall, staffing issues affected 56 percent of grantees.

The following table lists ways the pandemic interfered with services during the reporting period. Grantees were able to select more than one option. Despite these challenges, grantees reached thousands of vulnerable Californians during the reporting period.

#### **CONCLUSION**

During the reporting period, grantees undertook impactful projects that take a comprehensive approach to homelessness prevention legal aid. They offered essential legal help to those facing

homelessness from eviction, domestic violence, health care debt, and more. Grantees provided legal advice and representation addressing 12,812 HP needs across the state, and in doing so, prioritized underserved communities, especially clients with disabilities. Grantees held 620 legal trainings for over 19,500 participants and fielded over 7,000 hotline calls. Support centers held 181 trainings and 30 convenings and provided over 1,200 instances of research and technical assistance across seven areas of law. But for their interventions, thousands of low-income Californians would have faced the risks and harms of homelessness without critical legal help.

#### **Appendix E: Variations in Reporting Data**

In July 2023, the Judicial Council of California and State Bar reported to the Department of Finance about services with Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds. The Judicial Council of California analyzed the same data that this report analyzes. The reporting categories and analytical method, however, intentionally differ.

Grantees select a code to describe each HP need addressed in closed cases. There were 58 codes from which to choose (see Appendix B). The July 2023 report grouped the codes into five categories:

Grantees can report multiple HP needs addressed per case. That allows for a more complete picture of how services reduce homelessness than selecting just one need to describe each case. The July 2023 report, however, required looking at the number of extended services cases—not HP needs addressed—in each of the five categories. To avoid double counting cases, the report counted as one case instances where each of the five outcome categories above had repeat combinations of unique client ID and HP need addressed.

Additionally, there is a discrepancy between the other services data in the grantees' quarterly and annual evaluations. Other services refer to self-representation clinics, workshops/trainings,

outreach events, and informational hotline calls. Ideally, these numbers would match. They vary somewhat due to inconsistencies in grantee reports. This is likely because the grantees file their quarterly and annual evaluations at different points during the year. Grantees' quarterly evaluations showed more instances of other services than did their annual evaluations. This report uses data from the grantees' annual evaluations because it categorizes that work by area of law.



## **Equal Access Funds Report**:

**Preventing Homelessness Through Legal Services** 

Reporting Period: January 1, 2023-June 30, 2023

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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The Budget Act of 2022 allocated \$30 million in Equal Access Funds for homelessness prevention legal aid. After administrative costs, 95 percent of the funding was for competitive grants. The Legal Services Trust Fund Commission awarded 2023–2024 homelessness prevention (HP 4) funds in two tranches: initial and supplemental grants. Eligibility for both grants was limited to qualified legal services projects (QLSPs), nonprofits whose primary purpose is to provide civil legal aid to indigent Californians, and support centers, nonprofits whose primary purpose is to provide legal training, technical assistance, and advocacy support to QLSPs.<sup>2</sup>

Pursuant to the authorizing legislation, preference was given to projects that would serve rural or underserved communities and to projects that would partner with or subgrant to community-based organizations or local jurisdictions, provided the partnerships or subgrants were in effect as of June 30, 2022.

This report covers the first six months of HP 4 initial funding and services provided by grantees, from January 1, 2023, to June 30, 2023. During the reporting period, grantees:

- Addressed 1,915 homelessness prevention legal needs (HP needs) through attorneyclient relationships<sup>3</sup> for approximately 1,826 unique clients.
- Provided more than 16,500 individuals nonrepresentation legal help, including 3,313 hotline calls, 150 outreach events, 130 legal workshops/trainings, and 36 self-representation clinics.
- Recovered \$873,129 for clients through lump-sum and monthly payments.<sup>4</sup>
- Attained \$631,038 in lump-sum and monthly cost savings for clients.

- (Extended service) Negotiated settlement with litigation;
- (Extended service) Administrative agency decision;

 Provided support center services to more than 1,900 QLSP and non-QLSP legal advocates.<sup>5</sup> These services were provided through 20 live and on-demand trainings, 22 convenings, and 110 instances of research and other technical assistance.

Approximately sixty-two percent of the total HP needs addressed related to housing law. The remaining HP needs addressed related to obtaining public benefits, safety from domestic violence, and other ways of preventing homelessness.

Grantees closed cases in 28 of California's 58 counties. Approximately 93 percent of Californians live in the 28 counties where grantees closed cases. Projects that would serve rural communities received a preference for competitive funding in accordance with the grant parameters.

In addition to some rural communities, other underserved populations also benefited from these funds. Californians with disabilities accounted for 31 percent of total clients served whose HP needs were addressed. Seniors accounted for 27 percent of clients whose HP needs were addressed; clients with limited English proficiency accounted for 31 percent, and veterans accounted for 6 percent.

#### **DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS AND GRANT EXPENDITURES**

The Budget Act provided 95 percent of the funding for competitive grants and allows up to 5 percent of the funding to be used for administrative costs. The Legal Services Trust Fund Commission awarded HP 4 funds in two tranches: initial and supplemental grants.

Grantees were able to apply for both an initial grant and a supplemental grant. Initial grants started on January 1, 2023, and end on June 30, 2024 (18 months). Supplemental grants started on July 1, 2023, and end on June 30, 2024 (12 months). This report includes only the expenditures and services reported with funds from the initial grants.

In the first six months of 2023, grantees spent approximately \$6.8 million in HP 4 funds.

#### **DATA COLLECTION**

For each distinct legal problem giving rise to an attorney-client relationship, grantees reported:

- HP needs addressed (verified or not verified);
- Economic benefits (payments to and costs saved for) clients;
- Highest level of legal service;
- Client geography (county and zip code);
- Client demographics; and
- Household size.

Grantees often helped the same client with multiple legal issues such as eviction, unsafe housing, and loss of income. Sometimes multiple issues arose in a single case. Although client level data was collected, reporting on total clients or cases, therefore, can understate the full extent of grantees' services.

To better capture the amount and types of services provided, this report focuses on homelessness prevention legal needs (i.e., HP needs) addressed. Grantees reported 1,915 HP needs addressed with legal advice or representation. The number of unique clients was approximately 1,826.<sup>11</sup>

Grantees also reported on clinics, trainings, workshops, and hotline calls for self-represented litigants. For these nonrepresentation services, grantees reported only the area of law and total people served. More than 16,500 participants benefited from these other services.<sup>12</sup>


Support centers reported on legal trainings, technical assistance, and advocacy support to QLSPs and other community-based organizations. More than 1,900 participants benefited from these support center services.


Figure 1. HP Needs Addressed by Gender N=1,915.

More than half of all HP Needs addressed (56 percent) were for women.


Figure 2. HP Needs Addressed by Race/Ethnicity

Clients who identified as Hispanic/Latino accounted for the largest share (36 percent) of the HP needs addressed, followed by clients who identified as white (22 percent) and Black (17 percent).

#### Age

Two-thirds of the HP needs addressed were for clients between the ages of 18 and 59. Seniors accounted for 27 percent.

#### **Underserved Communities**

Projects with a focus on serving underserved communities received a preference for competitive funding. Grantees reported client demographics including clients who had limited English proficiency, disabilities, active-duty military status, and veteran status. The percentage of HP needs addressed for veterans and active-duty military is comparable to the percentage in California's population with the same status. Conversely, clients with disabilities and clients with limited English proficiency each represented 31 percent of the total HP needs addressed, while they represent only 25 percent and 17 percent of California's population, respectively.

#### **Urban versus Rural Services**

Grantees closed cases in 28 of California's 58 counties. While projects that serve rural communities received a preference for funding, the percent of rural and rural-urban HP needs addressed (13 percent combined) was less than the percent of urban-rural and urban HP needs addressed (87 percent combined). The following table compares HP needs addressed to the population eligible for services—those who live at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty threshold—by county type.<sup>18</sup>

#### **Race/Ethnicity by County Type**

HP needs were addressed for clients that identified as Hispanic/Latino more than any other race or ethnicity in urban-rural and urban counties. In rural counties, Hispanic/Latino clients' HP needs accounted for at least 33 percent of the HP needs addressed, and clients that identified as White also accounted for at least 33 percent of the HP needs addressed. In rural-urban counties, HP needs were addressed for clients that identified as White more than any other race or ethnicity, followed by Hispanic/Latino clients with at least 21 percent of all HP needs addressed.

# ATTORNEY-CLIENT RELATIONSHIPS: VERIFIED OUTCOMES, AREAS OF LAW, AND LEVELS OF SERVICE

Grantees reported the highest level of service for each HP need addressed and whether they could verify success. Inability to verify success does not always mean that the service was unsuccessful. Rather, it often means that the grantee lacked information about its success.

Grantees reported 611 verified outcomes and 1,304 unverified ones. Unverified outcomes were often cases where grantees provided legal advice or limited representation. Since those services can be brief, the grantees were sometimes unable to confirm whether the service succeeded.

#### **Housing and Income Maintenance Outcomes**

Among the 611 verified outcomes, over 57 percent were related to obtaining housing, preserving housing, or enforcing housing rights. Grantees also reported other outcomes that promoted housing stability such as obtaining, preserving, or increasing public benefits.

#### **Areas of Law**

Over 60 percent of the HP needs addressed were under housing (e.g., landlord-tenant) law. Grantees also reported HP needs addressed in income maintenance, immigration, domestic violence, and other areas of law related to homelessness prevention.

### **Levels of Service**

Legal advice was the highest level of service for most of the HP needs addressed, followed by representation in agency decisions, and then limited action. Services such as court decisions, settlements, and extensive services accounted for approximately 12 percent of the HP needs addressed. Extensive services can take considerable time to perform. As a result, these services might have been ongoing when grantees were reporting on closed cases.<sup>19</sup>

### ATTORNEY-CLIENT RELATIONSHIPS: MONETARY AWARDS AND SAVINGS

Data about monetary awards and savings are available in limited circumstances. Grantees reported these economic benefits when they were calculable and confirmed. An example of a calculable savings is waiver of back rent. Monetary awards and savings were not easily calculable for many homelessness prevention services (e.g., eviction defense and know-your-rights trainings).

In the table below, lump-sum payments and savings are economic benefits for which grantees could calculate the total amounts over time. For example, \$100 per month for six months would be a lump sum of \$600. Monthly payments and savings are economic benefits that continue for an unknown length of time. For those benefits, grantees reported just the monthly amounts and did not estimate length of time.

### **OTHER SERVICES**

Some services do not create an attorney-client relationship. These other services include self-representation clinics, legal workshops/trainings, community outreach events, and informational hotline calls. Over 79 percent of these other services focused on housing and income maintenance.

### **SUPPORT CENTER SERVICES**

Nine support centers received HP 4 initial grants. Although support centers can report addressing HP needs with an attorney-client relationship, they primarily provided legal trainings, technical assistance, and advocacy support to QLSPs—rather than indigent clients. Some of this work (e.g., trainings) is captured in the "Other Services" section of this report. Support centers also reported on trainings, convenings, research, and other technical assistance that they provided to QLSPs and other community-based organizations.

**Trainings:** Support centers held legal trainings and workshops for QLSPs, other community-based organizations, and the public on a range of homelessness prevention law issues. During the reporting period, support centers held a total of 20 training events across five areas of law.

**Convenings:** Support centers participated in meetings with QLSPs, other community-based organizations, and government agencies to evaluate and guide developments in homelessness prevention law. These meetings often related to local and statewide housing laws, public benefits, disability rights, and the protection of affordable housing. During the reporting period, support centers held a total of 22 convenings, the majority of which focused on housing and income maintenance.

**Research and technical assistance:** Support centers provided substantive law, project design, and evaluation support to QLSPs and community advocates through consultations, resource libraries, and other written materials. Areas of law addressed by research and technical assistance included housing, domestic violence and family law, and public benefits. During the

reporting period, support centers provided 110 instances of research assistance and technical support across five areas of law. The most assistance was provided in family/domestic violence law, with 71 total research and technical assistance (TA), including 54 instances of TA to non-QLSPs; this was followed by housing law, with 31 total research and TA, including 23 instances of brief technical assistance to QLSPs.

Additionally, support centers provided policy and advocacy support in partnership with QLSPs. The advocacy support was in housing, family/domestic violence, and health law, among other areas of law. These advocacy activities included:

- Advocated for policy improvements to protect tenants;
- Engaged in administrative advocacy to allow greater access to housing protections for tenants to obtain and keep housing;
- Provided comments on agency practices and laws that would give tenants increased access to eviction defense and protections;
- Advocated for the expansion of federal funding for legal aid organizations to engage in eviction prevention services; and
- Negotiated with city housing authorities to preserve tenancy for mobile homeowners.

### **IMPACT OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC**

Grantees reported that the COVID-19 pandemic affected the delivery of legal aid. More than half of grantees (54 percent) saw a decrease in the number of in-person events and experienced staffing challenges.

The following table lists ways the pandemic interfered with the ability to provide services during the reporting period. Grantees were able to select more than one option. Despite these challenges, grantees reached over 21,000 vulnerable Californians during the reporting period.<sup>22</sup>

### **CONCLUSION**

During the reporting period, grantees undertook impactful projects that took a comprehensive approach to homelessness prevention legal aid. They provided legal advice and representation addressing 1,915 HP needs across the state, and in doing so, prioritized underserved communities, especially clients with disabilities. Grantees held 130 legal trainings for over 5,000 participants and fielded over 3,000 hotline calls. Support centers held 20 trainings and 22 convenings and provided over 110 instances of research and technical assistance across five

areas of law. Without these interventions, thousands of low-income Californians would have faced the risks and harms of homelessness without critical legal help.
