Pretrial Reform Timeline

2013

 Conference of Chief Justices and Conference of Court State Administrators Joint Resolution

2016

- Former Chief Justice Cantil-Sakauye's State of the Judiciary highlighted concerns about the pretrial detention/release system
- Pretrial Detention Reform Workgroup (PDR) formed

2019

- Pretrial Reform and Operations Workgroup (PROW) established
- Pretrial Pilot Program formed through Budget Act of 2019 (AB 74)

2021

Pretrial Release Program formed through Budget Act of 2021 (SB 129)



Pretrial Pilot Program Budget Act of 2019 AB 74

- 17 courts
- Risk assessment tools required
- Extensive individual-level data reporting requirements
- Courts contract with county probation dept

vs. Pretrial Release Program Budget Act of 2021

SB 129

- 58 courts
- Risk assessment tools not required
- Minimal aggregate data reporting requirements
- Courts contract with probation dept. or other for pretrial services.



Pretrial Release Program Funding

- \$70 million in ongoing funding in FY 21–22
- \$70 million to nonpilot courts for one-time implementation costs
- Courts retain up to 30%—Pretrial Service Providers receive at least 70%
- Eligible Uses of Funding:
 - Costs associated with judicial officer pretrial release decisions
 - Data sharing technology
 - Court reminder systems
 - Ability-to-pay assessments
 - Supportive services, and monitoring practices

May 2023 Pretrial Release Year 1 Report to Legislature

- Covers first year of implementation of statewide expansion
- Provides court-reported data on booking and release outcomes
- Summarizes Judicial Council staff support
- Describes the allocation methodology
- Summarizes court activities, expenditure tracking, challenges encountered, and innovative usages of funds

Year 1 Preliminary Data

Approximately 426,000 Reported Bookings

163,000 Individuals Released Within Two Days

- 96,000–Misdemeanor
- 67,000–Felony

86,000 Individuals Released After 2 Days

- 26,000–Misdemeanor
- 60,000–Felony

177,000 individuals not released

• Includes individuals held on warrants, ineligible for release, who have not posted bail, or where released after the data submission date

Year 1 Challenges

COVID-19

- Changes in arrest patterns and arrest rates
- Residual effects of the statewide emergency bail schedule

Staffing

- Pretrial service providers struggling to recruit and train personnel
- Extensive workloads and lack of continuity of services

Data Collection and Sharing

- Continuity of data collection for reporting requirements
- Updating case management systems and developing data collection and sharing systems

Funding

Less than funding received than for pilot programs

Year 1 Successes

- All counties operational by June 30, 2022
- Establishing and/or strengthening relationships with local justice system partners
- Innovative usage of funds—connecting individuals released pretrial with voluntary supportive services
- Building up local technical infrastructures
- Data collection
- Court staff and judicial educational efforts

Next Steps for Pretrial Release Program

- Pretrial Pilot Report to Judicial Council in July
- Additional Data Collection in Year 2 of Program
 - Assessment Information from Pretrial Service Providers
- Continued technical support, financial review, site visits, and education efforts
