### Executive Summary

Government Code section 77202.5(a) requires that the Judicial Council report to the Legislature annually on allocations and reimbursements to the trial courts. The Judicial Council staff submitted to the Legislature on September 30, 2017, the *Report of Allocations and Reimbursements to the Trial Courts in Fiscal Year 2016–17*.

### Previous Council Action

### Methodology and Process

The allocations and reimbursements from state funds include the 2016–17 base allocations for court operations; reimbursement for specific trial court expenditure items including jury, self-help center, court interpreter, and court-appointed dependency counsel costs; fee revenue amounts that are distributed directly back to the reporting courts as directed in statute or by the Judicial Council; and funding awarded to individual trial courts from statewide programs including state and federal grants. Monies were provided from the following funds:

- Trial Court Trust Fund (\$2.081 billion);

- State Court Facilities Construction Fund–Immediate and Critical Needs Account (\$50 million);
- State Trial Court Improvement and Modernization Fund (\$17.854 million);
- General Fund (\$129.185 million);
- Federal Trust Fund (\$661.7 thousand); and
- Recidivism Reduction Fund (\$8.673 million).


