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Executive Summary

This report summarizes Judicial Council Court Innovations Grant Program activity for the first quarter of fiscal year (FY) 2019-20.

Relevant Previous Council Action

In March 2017, the council awarded \$23.5 million in total grants for projects designed to improve court efficiency and increase the public's access to justice. The council also allocated \$625,000—out of the statutorily authorized \$1.25 million—for administration costs and retained 3 to 4 percent of each category's funding for unforeseen expenses incurred by grant-funded projects.

In June 2017, the council delegated to the Judicial Branch Budget Committee (JBBC) authority to decide whether to approve funding adjustments. The delegation requires the JBBC to use the same criteria used in deciding the original awards and to report quarterly to the council about any authorized adjustments.

Analysis/Rationale

Award and budget adjustments

The JBBC approved two types of award and budget adjustments in the first quarter FY 2019-20:

Award increase

 \$109,574 for the Instant Family Law Orders project of the Superior Court of Santa Barbara County to expand the services provided by the vendor to provide additional onsite services and training.

Shifts between budget categories

- \$26,345.10 in the Reentry Court of the Superior Court of Inyo County to increase therapist/treatment provider services.
- \$43,843.87 in the Remote Video-Conferencing project of the Superior Court of Butte County for additional equipment, including hardware and software to create and post self-help videos.

Scope modification

The JBBC approved the following scope modifications in the first quarter of FY 2019-20:

- The Remote Video-Conferencing Technology project of the Superior Court of Butte County scope modification to allow participating courts to either participate in the Butte remote workshops or conduct their own remote workshops within their county.
- The Cooperative Parenting Program of the Superior Court of Shasta County scope modification to include an electronic ADR/mediation system for Family Law Parenting plans, allowing participants to communicate via email and to request a mediator to review the communications and provide alternative solutions to the participants.

Contingency fund balance

As of the date of this report, the balance of the contingency fund is \$653,148.05, allocated as follows:

- \$641,469.44 for collaborative court projects
- \$8,119.62 for self-help, family, and juvenile court projects
- \$3,558.99 for other efficiency projects

The courts below have identified budget savings and have expressed their intent to return previously distributed award:

- \$14,760.00 from the E-filing project of the Superior Court of Los Angeles County
- \$13,575.02 from the Traffic Avatar project of the Superior Court of Riverside County

- \$184,378.38 from the Evidenced Based Sentencing Triage Assessment Unit project of the Superior Court of San Diego County
- \$137,345.01 from the Cooperative Parenting Program of the Superior Court of Shasta County

If awards are returned as described above based on budget savings and withdrawal of a project, the balance of the contingency fund will be \$1,003,206.46, allocated as follows:

- \$825,847.82 for collaborative court projects
- \$159,039.65 for self-help, family, and juvenile court projects
- \$18,318.99 for other efficiency projects

The JBBC will continue to monitor the contingency fund closely and report on any changes.

Summary of findings

Of the 52² projects awarded grant funding, 50³ projects are moving forward. The amount awarded to these 52 projects totals \$23.7 million⁴. As of the first quarter of FY 2019-20, \$22.9 million⁵ has been distributed to the projects. The grant period covers three fiscal years, with money distributed only in the relevant fiscal year.

Of the \$22.9 million distributed to the awardee courts, \$12.4 million was expended by the awardees through FY 2019–20, quarter 1, with approximately \$923,000 expended in quarter 1. At the end of October 2019, grantee courts submitted their FY 2019-20 first-quarter reports. Council staff are continuing to reach out to grant awardee courts to schedule visits for post-implementation projects to interface directly with the enhanced court projects and, when appropriate, court users to complement both the administration of the grant and the outcome measurement reporting, thus giving the project a voice through this personal interaction. Concurrently, council staff are further discussing with the courts the project outcome measurement data and the units being measured to ensure that all appropriate data are being considered and tracked. Council staff have found that these visits facilitate the resolution of project administration concerns and the development of alternative outcome measurements. When necessary, an amendment will be completed for the project intra-branch agreement to reflect modified outcome measurements.

Fiscal Impact and Policy Implications

Implementation efforts

Following are project highlights as reported by the courts in the most current Quarterly Progress Reports or directly to council staff:

- The Superior Court of Riverside County's Intelligent Self-Help Kiosk project has reported a total of 25,309 jury electronic check-in's in the last quarter, bringing the total to 47,266. The Self-Help kiosks have provided help in six languages in 16,251 sessions during the last quarter. The court anticipates expanding services by installing 6 additional kiosks for a total of 24 kiosks throughout various locations.
- The Superior Court of Ventura County's Internet Based Self-help Workshops launched several internet-based self-help workshops in September 2018 to reach more self-represented litigants outside of walk-in services. In fiscal year 2018-19, 165 self-help webinars were conducted with 475 participants on the topics of family law, how to file a Request for Order, Divorce/Legal Separation/Nullity, civil law, what to expect at an eviction trial, and civil forms review. Participant surveys indicate that 83 percent felt more prepared with filing their courts forms and 91 percent felt more prepared for their court hearings because of their webinar participation.
- The Superior Court of San Joaquin County's Community Supervision Court (Drug and DUI Court) program was represented by graduating participants in the San Joaquin County Collaborative Courts 2019 Commencement Ceremony. Out of the 369 graduates, 208 (56 percent) had some connection to the project (including assessment and administration); 48 of these 208 participants (23 percent) received sober living/residential services. 59 percent of the graduates in the grant program received grant funded case manager support. Graduates were recognized for successfully completing all of their assigned requirements from the overarching Collaborative Courts Program.

Next steps

The JBBC and council staff will continue to collect and review quarterly reports; track project budgets, expenditures, and implementation plans; and measure projects' outcome goals. Staff will also continue to work with the projects to help gauge the innovation, efficiency, accessibility, modernization, replicability, sustainability, and cost impact of each project. Judicial Council Audit Services staff will assist with monitoring the grant program by conducting periodic reviews of specific grant programs.
