## Chief Justice Directive to ITAC



### Workstream Considerations

### **Procedures:**



- Participant scheduling
- Documenting agreements
- Calendar management
- Facilitating private discussions

#### **Rules:**



- Hearings & participants allowed
- Interpreter guidelines
- Quality control
- Cost for remote appearance

#### **Evidence:**



- Evidence exchange & presentation
- Court role in facilitating evidence exchange

### Technology:



- Participant technical requirements
- Evidence display
- Video displays in the courtroom



## Workstream Approach to Recommendations

- Provide general guidelines and allow flexibility for early adopters.
- Consistent with telephonic appearance concepts that provide general deference to local courts.
- Deviates from concepts around telephonic appearances by not including a presumption that video will be allowed.
- Authored before COVID-19, but should still be considered once emergency orders expire.

IUDICIAL COUNCIL

### Recommendations

- Change necessary Code of Civil Procedure, Government Code, and Rules of Court to specifically authorize video remote appearances
- Key Considerations Guide for Early Adopters of Video Appearances in California Courts



## COVID-19 Impacts and Inputs

- Vast majority of courts are performing remote hearings (civil and criminal)
- Provides experience and input, informs future decision-making
- Workstream's recommended changes enable remote video appearances post-COVID emergency



## Related Work Underway

Pursuit of legislative and rule changes



Direction to explore remote appearances in criminal proceedings

Develop recommendations for digital evidence

Funding received to implement remote video pilot solutions



## Legislative & Rule Changes

- Ad hoc subcommittee collaboration among several advisory committees:
  - Information Technology
  - Civil and Small Claims
  - Family and Juvenile Law
  - Probate and Mental Health
- Proposes new CCP §367.7, permitting all parties to appear in court by video in all civil actions and proceedings



# Remote Appearances for Criminal Proceedings

Technology Committee directed ITAC to further explore:

- Use case scenarios
- Technology standards
- Applicable Rules of Court



# Develop Recommendations for Digital Evidence

- Exploring the transmittal, acceptance, storage, and protection of digital evidence
- Evaluating related technologies and services, including through existing pilot efforts
- Proposing rule and statutory changes, as appropriate
- Developing a framework for possible future pilot efforts




# Implementing Remote Video Solutions

Technology Committee and ITAC directed JCIT to explore a pilot for remote video solutions:

- Seek funding
- Engage with vendors
- Apply recommendations from Remote Video workstream and Video Remote Interpreting workstream



## Remote Video Project: Completed Tasks



Initial funding
secured for
Futures
implementation

Created workgroup for requirements

Including courts of appeal, trial courts, and JCC Interpreter Team Distributed initial interest survey

15 courts responded with interest


**Circulated Request for Information**

Distributed survey on remote video use due to pandemic

31 trial courts
responded; 52% of trial
courts (30) confirmed
conducting some
remote video

## Remote Video Project: Next Steps



**Publish RFP** Conduct demos, identify solutions to deploy.

**Launch Pilot 1** 

Funded by Futures BCP for up to 5 courts\*. Develop recommendations for Pilot 2.

Launch Pilot 2

Targeting 8-10 additional courts.

Determine next steps.
