Executive Summary

The following information outlines some of the many activities staff are engaged in to further the Judicial Council's strategic goals and priorities for the judicial branch. The report focuses on action since the council's November meeting.

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2020 Year in Review

Annual highlights of Judicial Council actions to maintain and enhance equal access to justice for all Californians in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic were shared branchwide and posted on the California Courts Newsroom: <u>2020 Year in Review</u>.

New Court-Related Laws

The annual <u>New Laws Summary for the 2019–20 Legislative Session</u>, highlighting court-related legislation, was disseminated and posted on the California Courts public website.

New or Amended Local Court Rules

Thirty courts' new or amended local rules, effective January 1, 2021, were disseminated and posted on the public website at: <u>www.courts.ca.gov/3027.htm</u>.

Court Emergency Order Requests

A total of 428 court-requested emergency orders related to the COVID-19 pandemic have been reviewed and approved since the state of emergency was declared in March. As of January 19, 2021, 37 courts are operating with active emergency orders. A <u>directory</u> of the emergency orders approved by the Chief Justice is posted on the California Courts public website.

Budget

Following the release of the 2021–22 Governor's proposed budget, a summary of the proposal for the judicial branch was disseminated branchwide and statewide conference calls were held for judicial branch leadership to share information and respond to questions.

E-Filing Forum

An e-filing forum was convened for trial courts on e-service rule of court changes effective January 2021. Currently, 24 trial courts use e-filing.

Collaborative Courts

- The Judicial Council was awarded \$750,000 in grant funds from the federal Department of Justice/Bureau of Justice Assistance for a three-year Collaborative Court Data Improvement Project. The project will develop data collection standards and performance metrics and create an online communication hub allowing collaborative courts to share information.
- An online forum was convened for collaborative court judicial officers and staff to share challenges and experiences during the COVID-19 crisis.

Labor and Employee Relations

Labor negotiations assistance was provided to 17 trial courts. Services included bargaining preparation, side letter negotiations, and successor memoranda of understanding negotiations. Support was also provided to courts on 23 different labor and employee-related matters.

Court facility modifications as of January 2021:

• Twenty-five real estate transactions were completed, including new revenue licenses in Santa Clara and Siskiyou Counties; expense lease renewals in Glenn, Inyo, Kern, Los Angeles, Merced, and Santa Clara Counties; revenue license renewals in Orange and San Diego Counties; temporary jury assembly space license renewals in Amador, Colusa, Lake, Merced, and Tuolumne Counties; and license terminations in Los Angeles and Sonoma Counties.

MyCitations: Online Traffic and Ability to Pay

The Superior Court of Fresno County became the sixth pilot court to adopt MyCitations and offer online ability-to-pay determinations.

Pretrial Pilot Program

Contracts with the 16 Pretrial Pilot Programs were amended for a one-year extension (through fiscal year 2021–22) as allowed under Budget Act.

Family and Juvenile Law Advisory Committee

• Discussed finalizing recommendations for funding new Access to Visitation Program grants and midyear reallocation of funding for existing grant recipients, and recommended technical changes to child support enforcement and parentage forms.

Workgroup on Homelessness

• Workgroup members met with stakeholders in and outside of the judicial branch to consider the causes of homelessness, the impact of homelessness on the branch, innovation projects and other potential responses to the crisis.

Information Technology Advisory Committee

- Approved the 2021 annual agenda and received updates on the Court Technology Modernization Funding, branchwide e-filing, technical guidelines related to remote video, and the statewide self-represented litigant portal.
- *Data Analytics Workstream:* Issued a draft report on data and information governance policy concepts for public comment.

Jury Selection Work Group

• Investigated issues that arise outside the courtroom (summons process and yield) and discussed peremptory challenges and hardships.

Probate Mental Health Advisory Committee

• Reviewed the 2021 approved annual agenda, timelines for projects, Judicial Branch Statistical Information System revisions related to probate and mental health proceedings, and an American Bar Association resolution in support of establishing a national Guardianship Court Improvement Project.

Proposition 66 Implementation Working Group

• Reviewed and developed recommendations for the final report to the Chief Justice.

Definitions: Authorized Position (FTE)	Authorized positions include all regular ongoing positions approved in the Budget Act for that year. The number is based on the position's approved full time equivalency.
Filled Authorized Position (FTE)	Filled authorized positions are the number of authorized positions filled based on the employee's full time equivalency.
Headcount	The actual count of persons employed by the Judicial Council, regardless of FTE. This number could be more than the FTE count due to part-time employees being counted as "1". This count does not include Judicial Council Temporary Employees (909) or Employment Agency Temporary Workers.
Vacancy (FTE)	The number of vacancies is the number of authorized positions minus the number of filled authorized positions.
Vacancy Rate (FTE)	Vacancy Rate is calculated by dividing the number of authorized positions by the number of vacant authorized positions. This number excludes temporary employees ("909" funded employees). See definition of temporary employees below.
Judicial Council Temporary Employees (909)	The "909 category is the State Controller code used to reference a temporary position or a temporary employee. 909 Position - it is a position that may not be funded through the Budget Act and it is categorized by the Office of the State Controller as a temporary position used in the absence of an authorized position. 909 positions may be occupied by regular full-time employees due tot he unavailability of an authorized vacant position. 909 Employee - An employee whose salary is not funded through the Budget Act. 909 employees may receive benefits if employed at least half-time and the term of employment is for more than six months. Types of "909" Temporary Employees include: Retired Annuitants: A retired annuitant is a retiree who is hired by his or her former employer or by another employer that participates in the same retirement system as the former employer. This includes a former participant in a state retirement system who has previously retired and who is currently receiving retirement benefits. Temporary: Employees employed on a temporary basis - they do not receive full benefits (but do receive CalPERS retirement service credit).
Employment Agency Temporary Worker (FTE)	These are workers from an employment agency. They are employees of the employment agency that provide short-term support.
Contractor (FTE)	Individuals augmenting the work of the organization and providing services for a limited period of time or on a specific project, where a particular skill set is required that is either (1) not within an existing classification and/or job description or (2) where recruitment issues require the use of a contractor.
Full Time Equivalency (FTE)	Full Time Equivalency is the number of total maximum compensable hours designated in a year divided by actual hours worked in a year. For example, the work year is defined as 2,080 hours; one employee occupying a paid full time job all year would consume one FTE. One employee working for 1,040 hours each would consume .5 FTE.
Time Base	Full time: Employee is scheduled to work 40 hours per week. Receives full benefits. Part time: Employee is scheduled to work less than 40 hours per week. Employees that work more than 20 hours per week receive full benefits. Intermittent: Employees have no established work schedule and work on an as-needed basis that varies from one pay period to the next. Eligibility for certain benefits may be limited for these employees.
Regular Employee	Commonly referred to as "permanent employees" – They receive full benefits.
Limited Term	Limited Term Position – It is a position that is funded through the Budget Act with a specific end date. The position is counted as an authorized position. Employee in limited term positions may be regular or temporary.


