Executive Summary

The following information outlines some of the many activities staff are engaged in to further the Judicial Council's strategic goals and priorities for the judicial branch. The report focuses on action since the council's January meeting.

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Annual Judicial Demographics Report

The annual report on judicial demographics was released, showing a continued increase in judicial diversity for California's bench for the 15th straight year. As of December 31, 2020, female judicial officers constitute 37.6% of judicial officers across all court levels, a slight increase over the prior year and an increase of more than 10 percentage points since 2006—the first year that data were collected for this purpose. The bench also has continued to become more racially and ethnically diverse. The proportion of white judicial officers has declined about five percentage points since 2006, while the percentage of Asian, Black, and Hispanic judicial officers has nearly doubled over the same time period. Pathways to the Bench – Promoting Judicial Diversity

The Judicial Council and the California Lawyers Association are convening outreach sessions on Pathways to the Bench in collaboration with affinity and local bar associations. The first program of 2021 was held in February with more than 300 participants. The panel for the virtual session included the Governor's Judicial Appointments Secretary, Luis Céspedes, Deputy Judicial Appointments Secretary Gonzalo Martinez, and the State Bar's Commission on Judicial Nominees Evaluation Chair, Aminder Singh.

Legislative Advocacy

- Joint Legislative Hearing on Pandemic Impacts on Court Users and the Courts: The Chief Justice provided introductory remarks for the Senate and Assembly judiciary committees' joint informational hearing on COVID-19 and the courts focusing on assessing impacts on access to justice, identifying best practices, and the path forward.
- *Briefings for New Legislators:* A series of briefings on the judicial branch were coordinated for new members of the Legislature.
- *Budget Advocacy:* Judicial Council executive leadership and court representatives participated in the Senate Subcommittee No. 5 budget hearing on judicial branch proposals included in the 2021–22 Governor's Budget.

Court Emergency Order Requests

A total of 476 court-requested emergency orders related to the COVID-19 pandemic have been reviewed and approved since the state of emergency was declared in March 2020. As of March 10, 2021, 27 courts are operating with active emergency orders, 11 fewer than at the time of the January Judicial Council meeting. A <u>directory</u> of the emergency orders approved by the Chief Justice is posted on the California Courts public website.

Language Access Public Outreach Campaign

The Judicial Council launched a public outreach campaign to help educate limited English proficient court users on common court processes and the availability of language access services. The campaign includes public webinars to highlight multilingual educational materials available through the Language Access Toolkit, direct outreach to justice partners, and distribution of multilingual educational material to ethnic media. The multilingual materials are available Cantonese, Farsi, Korean, Mandarin, Russian, Spanish, Tagalog, and Vietnamese.

Infographics, videos, and public service announcements include information on: How to Request and Work with a Court Interpreter, How to Prepare for a Small Claims Trial, Serving Legal Papers, and Understanding Fee Waivers.

Labor and Employee Relations

Labor negotiations assistance was provided to 17 trial courts. Services included bargaining preparation, side letter negotiations, and successor memoranda of understanding negotiations. Support was also provided to courts on 19 different labor and employee-related matters.

Definitions: Authorized Position (FTE)	Authorized positions include all regular ongoing positions approved in the Budget Act for that year. The number is based on the position's approved full time equivalency.
Filled Authorized Position (FTE)	Filled authorized positions are the number of authorized positions filled based on the employee's full time equivalency.
Headcount	The actual count of persons employed by the Judicial Council, regardless of FTE. This number could be more than the FTE count due to part-time employees being counted as "1". This count does not include Judicial Council Temporary Employees (909) or Employment Agency Temporary Workers.
Vacancy (FTE)	The number of vacancies is the number of authorized positions minus the number of filled authorized positions.
Vacancy Rate (FTE)	Vacancy Rate is calculated by dividing the number of authorized positions by the number of vacant authorized positions. This number excludes temporary employees ("909" funded employees). See definition of temporary employees below.
Judicial Council Temporary Employees (909)	The "909 category is the State Controller code used to reference a temporary position or a temporary employee. 909 Position - it is a position that may not be funded through the Budget Act and it is categorized by the Office of the State Controller as a temporary position used in the absence of an authorized position. 909 positions may be occupied by regular full-time employees due tot he unavailability of an authorized vacant position. 909 Employee - An employee whose salary is not funded through the Budget Act. 909 employees may receive benefits if employed at least half-time and the term of employment is for more than six months. Types of "909" Temporary Employees include: Retired Annuitants: A retired annuitant is a retiree who is hired by his or her former employer or by another employer that participates in the same retirement system as the former employer. This includes a former participant in a state retirement system who has previously retired and who is currently receiving retirement benefits. Temporary: Employees employed on a temporary basis - they do not receive full benefits (but do receive CalPERS retirement service credit).
Employment Agency Temporary Worker (FTE)	These are workers from an employment agency. They are employees of the employment agency that provide short-term support.
Contractor (FTE)	Individuals augmenting the work of the organization and providing services for a limited period of time or on a specific project, where a particular skill set is required that is either (1) not within an existing classification and/or job description or (2) where recruitment issues require the use of a contractor.
Full Time Equivalency (FTE)	Full Time Equivalency is the number of total maximum compensable hours designated in a year divided by actual hours worked in a year. For example, the work year is defined as 2,080 hours; one employee occupying a paid full time job all year would consume one FTE. One employee working for 1,040 hours each would consume .5 FTE.
Time Base	Full time: Employee is scheduled to work 40 hours per week. Receives full benefits. Part time: Employee is scheduled to work less than 40 hours per week. Employees that work more than 20 hours per week receive full benefits. Intermittent: Employees have no established work schedule and work on an as-needed basis that varies from one pay period to the next. Eligibility for certain benefits may be limited for these employees.
Regular Employee	Commonly referred to as "permanent employees" – They receive full benefits.
Limited Term	Limited Term Position – It is a position that is funded through the Budget Act with a specific end date. The position is counted as an authorized position. Employee in limited term positions may be regular or temporary.


